BROAD CAMPAIGNS ON PEARS PLANNED

The largest all-coast gathering of pear growers and dealers yet held is planned in connection with the annual convention of the Oregon State Horticultural society in Medford November 12 to 15. The call for such a meeting sent out by Clayton L. Long, secretary-treasurer of the society and extension specialist in horticulture at the state college, has received hearty response from many sections of Oregon, Washington and California already.

Coordination of all pear interests in support of a national advertising campaign and other projects affecting the whole western industry is sought, according to Mr. Long. With the completion of important work in pear production, harvesting and storage investigations, more attention can be given to widening the markets, it is believed.

The regular meeting of the horticultural society will take up a program of general interest as usual, with a half day set aside for the first time for a garden club program. H. Van Hovenberg, Jr., is president of the society which is one of the oldest agricultural organizations in the state.

AN EVER GROWING PROBLEM

Automobile accident legislation fails to strike at the root of the problem. Liability insurance, which all should carry, indemnifies but cannot prevent accidents.

In most states driving laws are antiquated and are laxly enforced. As a result incompetent and careless drivers crowd the public highways, an ever-present menace to the lives of all of us.

Licenses to operate a motor car are usually granted without examination, or without inquiry into the fitness of the applicant. Only a few of our states surround the issuance of licenses with any restrictions. The competent and competent, the reckless and careless, the law-breaking and the law-abiding are treated alike.

It is no wonder that under such circumstances the accident toll continues to mount. We can never check this devastating record until our laws refuse the use of public highways to drivers who have been proven incompetent or chronically reckless.

CRIME CROSSROADS

We are at a cross-roads in our policy toward crime and the criminal. For a number of years there has been a definite trend away from basic American ideas, namely, unhampered freedom for citizens who live within the limits of their constitutional rights and fundamental laws. A new era has sought to correct every evil by passing more laws which apply to the law-abiding as well as the law-breaker.

In the face of the known fact that crime is a psychological social condition that must be treated as a disease, we pass laws against inanimate instruments of crime, such as revolvers, and pistols, thinking thereby to correct the criminal.

We might just as well pass laws against skating, duck hunting, fishing, etc., on the theory that some persons would thereby be prevented from contracting colds which might lead to tuberculosis.

The person who has committed a crime and the person who has contracted a disease must be treated individually. We should not endeavor to make 10,000 normal persons live up to regulations for one sick person or one criminal.

GRAFT ON THE AIR

The Better Business Bureau is to investigate and fight "get-rich-quick" schemes promulgated by means of the radio.

The absence of laws prohibiting the broadcasting of matter that would be barred by post office authorities if sent through the mails, and the wide range of audience, makes the radio a perfect mode of expression for the dishonest promoter.

The management of broadcasting stations has the power to curb fraud of this sort, and the better class stations are cooperating to guard against misuse of their facilities. However, it is probable that the stock grafter will always be able to hire a station to broadcast his message to prospective "suckers."

The mails, the telegraph and the telephone have all played a part in the selling wiles of the promoter. It is but logical that the radio should come next. And the public is almost entirely without protection.

A solution is in the hands of the stock-purchasing public. Before buying any stock one should make it a point to discuss its merits with a responsible broker or banker. If everyone followed this plan, the day of the dishonest stock salesman, whether he operated over the radio or through the mails, would be over.

HOPE FOR THE FUTURE

Many persons wonder what will happen to the steamships, railroads and automobiles when all the oil in the world is used up. They wonder if transportation costs will not be greatly increased and operation of business and modes of living disorganized.

Any such misgivings have been without basis. The oil industry, without much ostentation, has made an ample supply of petroleum products as certain for the future as is the supply of wheat.

Indeed it may be said to be more secure, for the supply of wheat is dependent to a very great extent upon weather conditions, which are variable, while improved technique in geological exploitation, drilling practice, and more economic manufacture and use of petroleum products, together with scientific research, have made continuity of oil supply certain.

FAMILY WILL LIKE THEM IF YOU FIX THEM RIGHT

Do you have to thrust vegetables upon your family, insisting that they eat them "because they are good for you" or do you make them so attractive that the family demands them? It's all in the manner of preparation, says the home economics department of Oregon State college.

For instance, it is essential to keep the vegetables whole or in uniform attractive pieces, and to preserve the natural color as much as possible. And cook them the shortest time possible—till they are barely tender. Longer cooking detracts from color and flavor, and injures the vitamin and natural mineral content so that little Johnny has to eat twice as much spinach to get the necessary amount of food value.

Allowing many vegetables to stand after cooking before being served also often causes them to become strong in flavor and unattractive in appearance. If all these points are observed, and care is taken to vary both the kind served and the manner of serving them, the family will soon enjoy their vegetables.

Can you imagine a nice juicy grape pie without any seeds in it? It is really quite easily accomplished. Just slip the skins off enough grapes for the pie, and put them in one container. Then cook the pulp just long enough to loosen the seeds, and then put through a coarse sieve. Put the skins and the pulp together and proceed as usual.
