A suit for \$52,853 damages has been filed in circuit court by Raymond E. Taylor against Harry M. Kerron, Florence M. Kerron and Portland Riding Club.

Taylor alleges in his complaint that he is a beginner in horse back riding and that on May 24th 1929, he applied to the defendants for rental of a gentle riding horse. He alleges that a horse named "Shifty" was furnished him with the assurance that it was gentle and would not buck. Taylor states he rode the horse a short distance and was thrown receiving injuries. He also alleges that the defendants knew the horse to be a famous buckner and that they were careless and negligent to him. He asks for \$50,000 general damages because of the injuries and mental anguish and \$2,853 for hospital, doctor and nurses fees.

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
