COUNTY DISPLAY OF LAND PRODUCTS WINS 21 RIBBONS

Scholls District Potatoes Take Six Out Of Seven Ribbons

Washington county won twenty-one blue ribbons on the farm products assembled and taken by the county agent's office to the Land Products Show now in progress in connection with the Pacific International Livestock Show at Portland.

In the six market classes of wheat Washington county won three first prize awards, with entries made in only four classes, in competition with wheat from all parts of the Northwest.

In the oats exhibit the county won first in all classes.

The Scholls community won six blue ribbons of a possible seven in the potato classes. The potatoes in these winning classes were selected by Bert Rowell of Scholls.

Robert Forbis of Dilley won three blue ribbons in the walnut and filbert classes.

Woman Injured

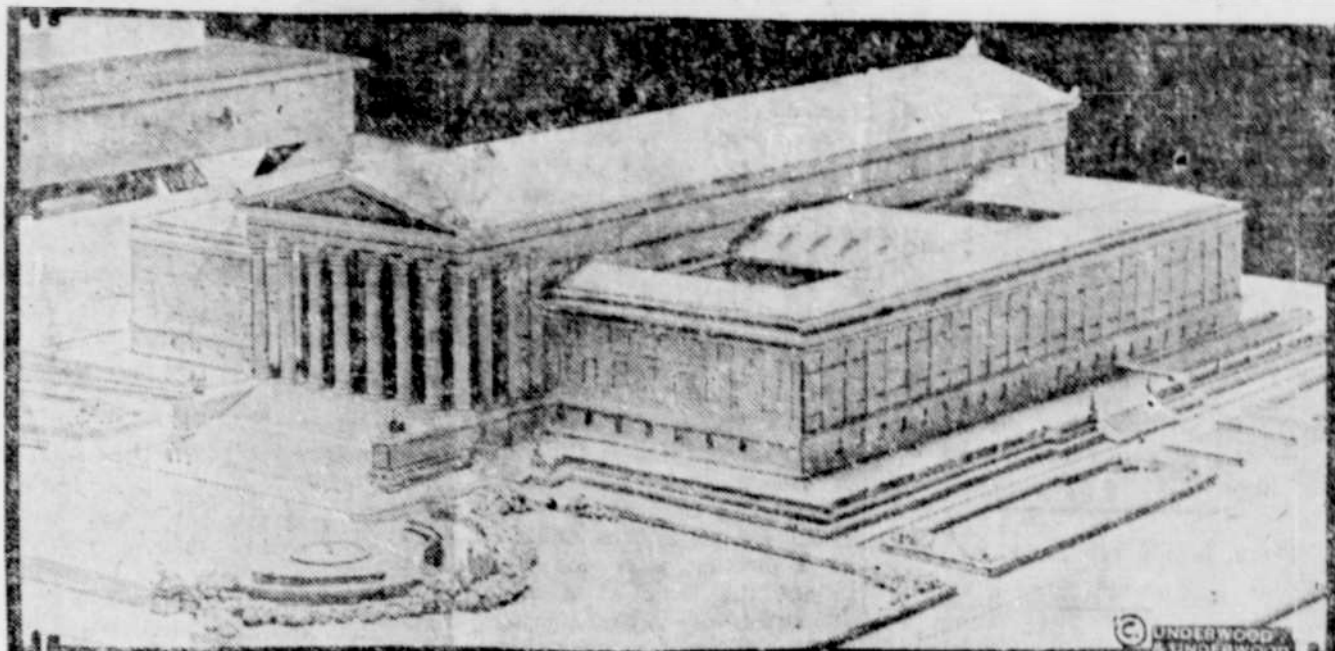

To be eligible to compete in this class the boys must have raised an acre of corn and must exhibit 25 ears.

There were ten entries from Western Oregon, Washington county had five boys entered and captured the first five places.

Donald Schmeltzer, Chehalem mountain, won third on Burbank potatoes and Walter Peters won second on Early Ohio potatoes in the 4-H Club classes.

In the crop judging contest, Washington county won fourth place with teams competing from Oregon, Washington and Idaho. John Strickler, Donald Schmeltzer and Donald Eddy represented this county.

Highways To Be Made Safer for Driving

Hazards of night driving will be considerably lessened during the coming winter months if Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss is successful in his plans to eliminate the "one-eyed" automobiles, or cars with only one head light, from Oregon highways.

"There is no excuse for so many cars operating with only one headlight," says Mr. Hoss, "and I am determined to see conditions improved over what they have been. I expect soon to issue general instructions to the state traffic patrol to wage relentless war against the 'one-eyed' automobiles, and will ask all sheriffs, town marshals and other peace officers to cooperate. If reports indicate that it will be necessary to take violators into court, in addition to giving warnings, I will issue orders to that effect. Heretofore violators have gotten off with warnings, but I believe the offense serious enough to justify a fine. A combination of wet pavement, high speed, and a car with one headlight only, results too often in an accident. Motorists are urged to lend their cooperation in this campaign by keeping both headlights in proper working order."

Trial Flight Success

A successful trial flight was made Sunday by the new five passenger airplane belonging to the National Aircraft Corp., of Beaverton. The plane remained in the air several hours, making a safe landing at Watts Airport. Plans are being made for passenger service to Tillamook soon.

WORK ON TUNNEL PROJECT RAPIDLY PROGRESSING

Floating of Bond Issue for Tunnel Due In Early Spring

Another definite step toward the projected Tualatin tunnel will be taken with the arrival November 4, of Clayton Fyler, of the staff of tunnel engineers of New York, and he will begin the final traffic survey preparatory to the work.

During his visit to Portland in September Mr. Chase compared this project with a similar one undertaken at Pittsburg and added that in the eastern case there had not been nearly as opportune an area to be reached by the tunnel as Portland has. The Tualatin tunnel will reach a valley which runs west to Hillsboro and south to the Willamette river.

Engineering for the project is expected to be completed by February 1930, according to Ben Reiland the secretary of the corporation, and it is expected that the floating of a bond issue to cover construction costs will take another month, making early spring the time for the start of construction.

Auto Accident Fatal To Small Girl

Betty June Jenkins, 6 years old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Jenkins R. F. D. 1, Newberg, suffered injuries which caused her death in an accident last Sunday morning, when the car in which she was riding collided with another.

Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins and their two children, together with Mr. and Mrs. Howard Jenkins, were traveling toward Portland through Tigard in a Ford sedan. It was raining, and the pavement was slippery. As they neared the vicinity of the Catholic church, a car drove out upon the highway from the church. Mr. Jenkins applied his brakes in an effort to prevent a smashup with the intersecting car, which caused his Ford to skid sideways and continue at right angles toward the Catholic church.

At the same time, a car driven by R. G. Marsh, of 1014 East 12th St., north Portland, was proceeding toward Newberg. Mr. Marsh also applied his brakes in an attempt to prevent a collision with the car driven out from the church, and likewise skidded and turned at a right angle toward the church. The Jenkins car and the Marsh car met in a sideswipe, eight feet off the pavement on the church side of the road, resulting in the sad accident heretofore related.

Mrs. Howard Jenkins was badly cut by flying glass. The two victims of the tragedy were taken to the home of Dr. Vincent, nearby, where first aid was rendered by the doctor and Elmore Badley. The little girl's head was crushed by the impact, and she lived but two hours after the collision.
