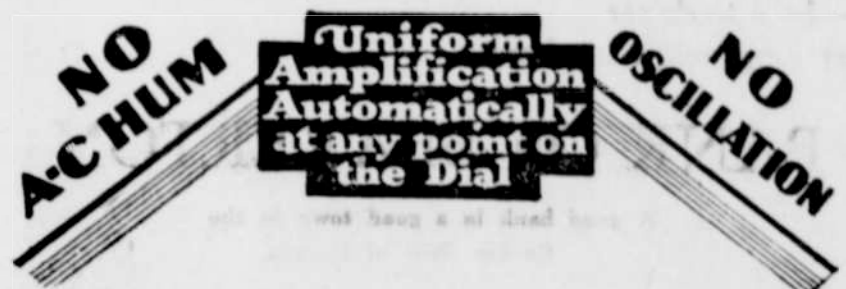
Wins Suit for Damages
