Red Cross Quota For Washington County \$600

Roll Call of the American Red Cross will begin Armistice Day, November 11th and continue until Thanksgiving Day, according to H. L. Bates chairman of Washington County Chapter. The quota for the county is \$600.00, one-half of which remains in the local treasury for county relief work. During the past year, the National Red Cross rendered aid to 117 domestic and 3 insular disasters in which over 856,000 people were given aid. This year destruction by disasters in the United States were widespread as is shown by the fact that 38 of our states were affected by one or more types of disasters where it was necessary for the Red Cross to render aid—sometimes being called upon to administer aid three times.

The quota for the towns in the county follows: Hillsboro \$225.00; Forest Grove, \$225; Beaverton \$35; Cornelius \$20; Laurel \$10; Banks \$15; North Plains \$15; Gales Creek \$10; Tigard \$20; Timber \$10; Metzger \$20; Bethany \$20; Buxton \$15; Sherwood \$20; Gaston \$25; Orengo \$15; Hillside \$15; Scholls \$20; Watts \$15; Kansas City \$10; Leisyville \$5.

The chairman of the Beaverton district is Mrs. J. C. Huntley. The chairman for Tigard district is Mrs. Herbert McDonald.

Statement by Arthur M. Hyde, Secretary of Agriculture of the United States.

Whenever wide spread disaster visits any part of the country, Red Cross relief becomes essentially farm relief. It not only tides the stricken farmer over the emergency but helps him to reestablish himself under better conditions—better as to housing and better as to produce. The diversified farming introduced into the Mississippi Delta after the great flood of two years ago was in large part accomplished through the Red Cross and its local chapters.

The American Red Cross has also identified itself with our rural life through its health services, with rural nurses in the field and teachers of home hygiene and care of the sick and of nutrition. It has also aided the ex-service man on the farm in presenting his claims for compensation.

I urge the American farmers to give the American Red Cross increased support through membership with a view to expanding its useful services.
