UNITED WESTSIDE CLUBS MEET AT MULTNOMAH

Much Discussion Put Forth on the Several Road Improvements Necessary

Transportation, roads, highways, quicker and better transportation, wider and safer roads was the nucleus around which discussion centered and speakers made their talks at the meeting of the United West Side Clubs Tuesday night at the Multnomah school auditorium.

The paving of Terwilliger boulevard with a nonskid surface will be referred to the City Planning Commission and the re-routing of the street cars on Sixth street so as to relieve traffic congestion is being given consideration so stated A. E. Melin of the transportation committee.

C. J. Stickney working with a committee of four stated many road and highway problems are being studied and a report will be ready for the next meeting.

C. H. McClure, secretary of the City Planning Commission, gave an instructive talk illustrated with colored slides showing how cities throughout the country had taken care of traffic problems.

It is a simple problem, as outlined by Mr. McClure, when men of vision have planned arteries of travel and have acquired a right of way sufficient for future growth and needs.

At the present time the City Planning Commission advisory board has jurisdiction only six miles out from the city limits. If a regional planning association could be formed the entire Pacific Northwest would be under its jurisdiction and steps are being taken to form such an association.

Mr. McClure further stated that now is the time to get action on the Fourth street project as this is near the point of decision, whether it will be accepted or turned down.

To investigate the advisability of seceding a part of Washington county and annexing it to Multnomah county as proposed by Thomas T. Georges a committee will be appointed by the president.

C. W. Noyes and Milton C. Miller spoke briefly in regards to the Super highway from Portland to Salem and C. S. Stow for the American Red Cross enrollment period from Nov. 10 to 25.
