

Engineers Meet Needs of the Woman Driver

Just as artists, designers and decorators have, for a number of years, been guided by the taste and sense of style of the woman motorist, so is her influence on the mechanical details of the car being felt today in the engineering laboratories of the manufacturers.

In the evolution of the automobile the woman was given first consideration in the choice of body lines, color treatments and inner refinements.
