City to Improve Lombard Street

The city council at their regular meeting last Monday reached a final decision to improve Lombard street from the end of the pavement to the city limits and the street committee was instructed to make the necessary arrangements. The committee was also authorized to hire men to remove the brush along Lombard and Erickson avenue.

J. W. Sprague and V. H. Woods reported on their trip to Hillsboro in regard to the assessable value of Watson street property. They found by the records that Washington street, from 5th street south, is still in the Hookens addition, as it has never been dedicated to the city.

Property owners along Broadway presented a petition requesting a survey of the street and asked that it be made into an improvement district in order that the street may be widened.

Cooperative Creamery Discussed at Meeting

An interesting meeting attended by about forty dairymen, was held in Wheeler hall at Aloha, Tuesday forenoon, the purpose of the meeting being to discuss the advisability of organizing a cooperative creamery or cheese factory. The meeting was in charge of County Agent O. T. McWhorter who was assisted by N. T. Jamison, dairy expert with the extension service of the Oregon Agricultural college.

The condition of the market now and for some time past has been such that the dairymen have not been able to realize for their product the actual cost of production, and all were unanimous in a decision that only through some sort of an organized effort can anything be accomplished to better this most important industry. Mr. Jamison presented facts and figures which showed that, under present market conditions, a small creamery or cheese factory drawing a support from only 300 to 500 cows would not improve the situation at all, but that a large organization could do a great deal of good. In this connection it was also shown that within a radius of three miles of Aloha there is over 2000 dairy cows and by going out a little further this number can be doubled and tripled. It was also reported that there is now under way at least three movements for some sort of dairymen organizations being sponsored by Portland interests, so a committee of three was named, to make a study and thorough investigation of the entire situation and report back to a larger meeting to be held after the first of the new year. This committee is composed of A. E. Kern, who owns a large dairy farm near Hazeldale, Frank O'Meara, pioneer dairyman of Elmonica, and C. J. Stickney, of the Aloha Finance Corporation.

This committee is already earnestly at work, and it is believed that out of this little preliminary meeting of Tuesday forenoon will result an organization of a great deal of benefit to the dairy industry of this section.

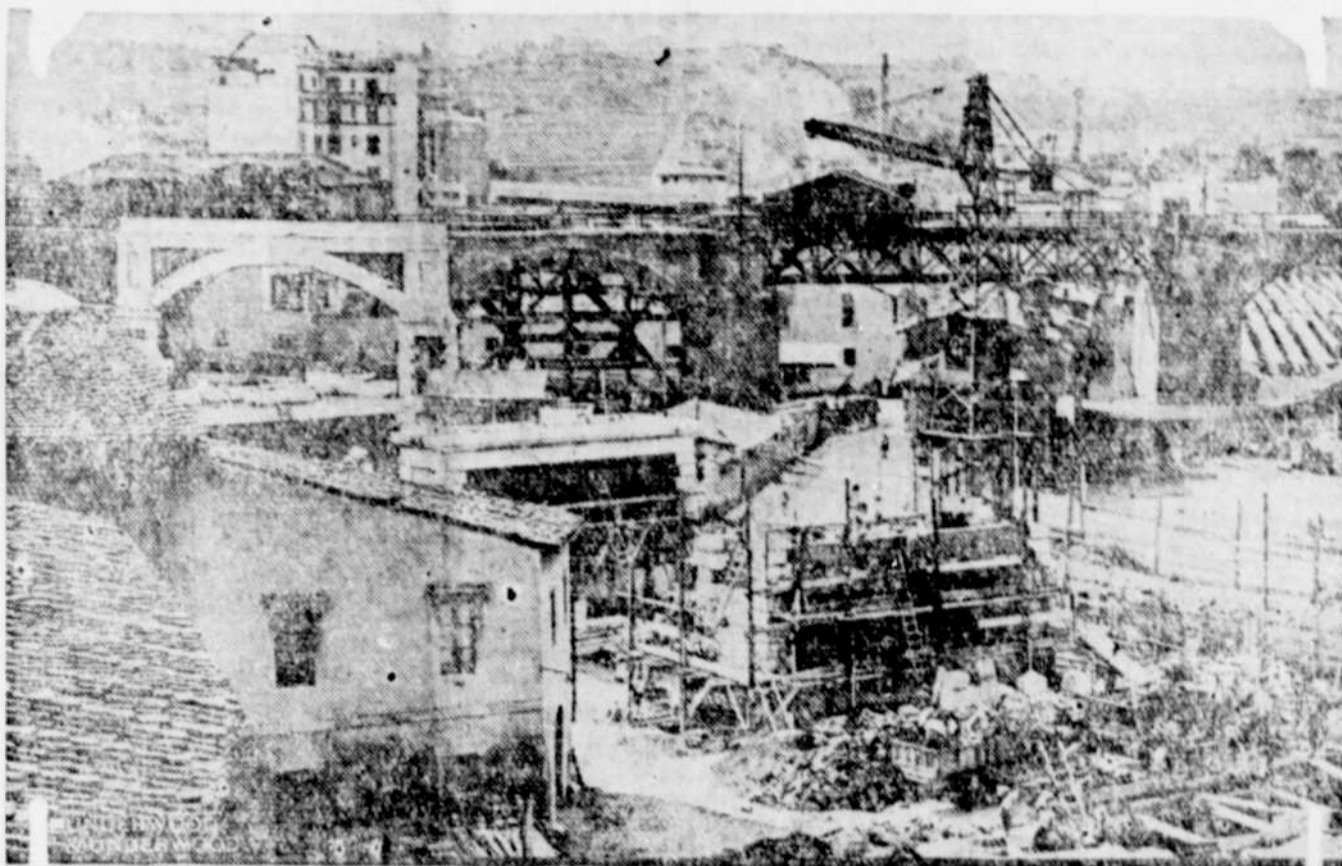

E. Schulmerick faces Two Damage Suits

The jury in the case of Austin Pharis against Edward Schulmerick and son, Melvin Schulmerick, found for the plaintiff against Melvin Schulmerick in the sum of \$957.45. Pharis sought damages in the sum of \$10,782.45 for injuries which he claimed were the result of a collision of his automobile with one driven by Melvin Schulmerick on May 6, 1927, at the corner of Fifth and Oak streets, Hillsboro.

This suit, along with one by Mrs. Pharis against the Schulmericks was filed May 3, 1929. Mrs. Pharis asks for damages in the sum of \$559.00 which she claims for injuries she sustained in the same accident. The latter suit has not yet come up for trial.

Late reports from the national capitol are that the senate have voted to retain the 5 cent tariff on filbert and 10 cents a pound on shelled nuts. Western Oregon filbert growers with a favorable market are bound to develop an important and profitable industry.

OTTO ERICKSON IS ELECTED MAYOR

Otto Erickson was re-elected to serve as Beaverton's mayor by a vote of 245, while A. E. Wilson received 29 votes. Councilman Alexander was also re-elected with 247 votes and J. R. Talbert, the new councilman received 270 votes.

F. J. Dietsch led in the race for recorder-treasurer office by 8 votes he receiving 172 votes against Geo. Thynn 164.

Unusual interest was shown in this election, according to the poll record 337 votes were cast this year in comparison to 284 last year.

Beaverton S. P. Tower Being Dismantled

The railroad tower, at the intersection of Lombard street and the highway in Beaverton, is being dismantled and the rumors are that it is to be shipped to Albany for a new logging road.

This tower was constructed August 7, 1911, and some of the operators were J. H. Gross, for 15 years, Claude Johnson was relieved after 2 years by John Rowe who stayed on the job 16 years. Jeff DuZan had this post for quite some time until transferred to Portland recently.

A. J. Butler and Mr. Rowe were in charge of the tower when it was closed at 11:30 Wednesday.

Hatchery Increases to 37,000 Egg Capacity

The Hart Hatchery, with the purchase of the Aloha Hatchery, have increased their incubators to a capacity of 37,000, and is found to be about the busiest spot in Oregon. For the past week they have been moving the recently purchased property to their place on Huber avenue.

Mr. and Mrs. Hart who have always managed their own place of business, started 17 years ago with an incubator of 11 thousand capacity. None of the chickens are raised by them but they have contracts with the various farmers to take the output. Mr. Hart inspects their stock for bacillary diarrhoea, one of the most severe of chick diseases.

Their specialty is day old chicks and they ship to all parts of the United States.
