

## No Shock in Auto Crash Unless Hurt High Court Rules

Motorists cannot collect for "fright" or "nervous shock" in accidents, unless they are physically hurt.

A physical injury is necessary, under the decisions of District of Columbia courts based on leading precedents and just upheld by the supreme court. The highest court refused to review the suit of Frances and Lulu K. Perry, Washington women, who claimed they were badly frightened when a streetcar bumped their automobile.

The court of appeals held no recovery was possible for shock, when the shock was not shown to have proceeded from physical injuries.

## SERVICE TO CITIES PLANNED BY U. OF O.

Municipal Reference Bureau to be Organized With Experts in Charge of Work.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore.—A municipal reference service to be state wide in scope is being established at the University of Oregon, announced by James H. Gilbert, Dean of College of Literature, Science and Arts and Head of the Department of Economics. The new organization will have for its aim, so far as its resources make it possible, to furnish inquiries, give advice, and furnish information on news of municipal administration.

Research in this field will be conducted by experts in the Departments of Economics and Political Science at the University, and findings will be made available to those interested in municipal affairs. Dr. James D. Barnett, head of the Department of Political Science, and a specialist in the study of municipal governments, law of municipal corporations, and city administration, will be chairman of the organization. Dr. Barnett has been a member of the University faculty for more than twenty years; has studied and written extensively about Oregon political problems and at times has been consulted by municipalities regarding charters and other phases of organization.

Expert on Board. The second member of the Committee includes Dr. Emerson Schmidt, Professor of Economics, who received his training at the University of Wisconsin in the closely related fields of public utilities and labor and industrial relations. Mr. Schmidt has given a great deal of time and attention to the study of municipal utilities, both publicly and privately owned. He also studied under John R. Commons, noted authority on labor problems at Wisconsin.

The other member of the Committee is Dr. James M. Reinhardt, Professor of Sociology, who has had considerable experience in the field of community organization. His advice will be available on questions connected with community organization, public relations, and social problems peculiar to Oregon communities.

Other Departments Help. This central committee will draw on other departments of the University for assistance whenever needed. Already the School of Business Administration and Bureau of Public Research, the School of Physical Education, School of Architecture, School of Journalism, and the Law School, have done considerable community and municipal work. The Law School is just finishing a survey of state legislation bearing on the problem of stream pollution, and Dr. James H. Gilbert has just completed an extended study of the Wealth, Debt and Taxation in ninety-eight Oregon cities.

The organization will be provided with an office and a secretary to take care of correspondence and keep records. The cities throughout the state are urged to address inquiries to this body at the University. Results of their studies in the form of news items will appear from time to time in the columns of Pacific Municipalities and in the Commonwealth Review, it is announced.

## TWO BANDS PLANNED AT UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

University of Oregon, Eugene. — Two different bands at the University of Oregon is the plan put in progress by John H. Stehn, new leader of the bands at the university and a member of the faculty of the school of music. One band will play at all athletic events while the other will play for concerts only, the latter group being an innovation this year.

Sixty men have tried out for the university bands, according to Mr. Stehn. The leader has conceived the idea of sponsoring Sunday afternoon concerts for students and townspeople. Definite action on this matter will be taken up later. In dividing his proteges into two groups, Mr. Stehn has reserved 30 pieces for the concert band and allowed at least 50 men accommodations for playing at athletic events.

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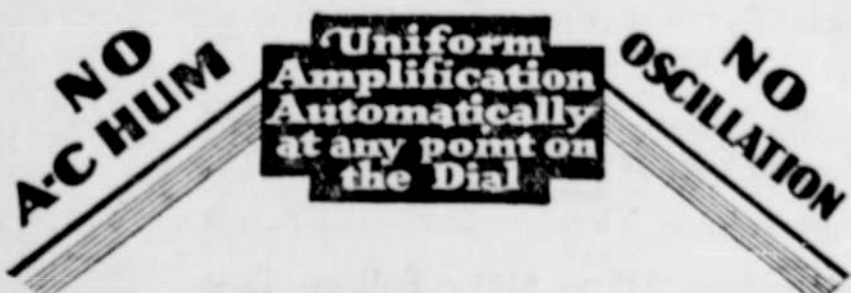
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
