

Urge Relocation of Scholls Ferry Road

A large delegation of West side property owners and a number of Washington county residents appeared before the Multnomah county commissioners Wednesday, urging the re-location of the Scholls Ferry road from the Bertha-Beaverton highway to a connection with the Canyon road.

The commissioners were told the Scholls Ferry road now is a first-class improved road from the Bertha-Beaverton highway south for 15 miles into Washington county, and that the proposed improvement in Multnomah county would result in a saving of about 10 minutes to motorists who now come into Portland over Terwilliger boulevard.

A feature of the exhibit was the exceptional high quality of all products. There were 18 entries in the commercial Burbank class from both Clackamas and Washington counties.

The banquet provided by the Chamber of Commerce of Sherwood and the Sherwood Grange for the prize winners at the recent Land Products show, was attended by winners from all parts of the county. C. D. Ninton, of Forest Grove, and Land Products show manager, presented the silver trophy to the Washington County Court, this organization being represented by Commissioner F. W. Livermore, of Aloha. county, who discussed boys' and girls' club work and the importance of doing the work thoroughly as a training program for boys and girls.

E. L. Ludwick, assistant manager of the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers was the main speaker of the evening and discussed at length the features of the new federal farm loan board and pointed out that cooperative marketing efforts, in order to receive the assistance of this board, must be on a much broader and comprehensive scale than heretofore.

Application Blanks Out for Licenses

Six tons of mail, filling 300 large sacks and consisting of application blanks for the 1930 motor vehicle licenses, were sent out Tuesday by the office of Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, in preparation for the license renewal period. The 275,000 pieces of mail will convey a warning to the automobile owners of the state of the approach of the time for obtaining permits issued under new changes in the motor vehicle laws and will carry a gratifying message of the reduced license fees.

The postage bill for the huge shipment runs over \$2,700, the bulk of the letters going out under a special permit of one cent each. Bundling and stacking of the letters are taken care of by the automobile division of the state department and delivery of the major portion of the material is made direct to the trains, which obviates the necessity of a second handling of each individual letter by the Salem postoffice and speeds up delivery along the line.

Additional Revenue Available from Tax

More than \$2,000,000 in additional revenue will be collected by their state of Oregon in 1930 as a result of the one cent per gallon increase in the state tax on gasoline and distillate sales, bringing the total receipts from this source to \$7,052,054 according to a tentative estimate made by Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state. After January 1, 1930, this tax will be four cents per gallon on gasoline and three and one-half cents on distillate, the new rate being the first change since the rise in 1923.
