POULTRY BUILT ON COMMERCIAL EGG BUSINESS

Operation on a man sized scale, attention to details, and observance of recognized practices will produce for the Oregon poultryman a good income and provide a competence for old age, according to H. E. Cosby extension poultry specialist from the Oregon State college. The next twenty years look better for the poultryman than the last twenty, was the opinion of Mr. Cosby, who talked on Wednesday December 4, before more than 70 poultrymen of the county in two meetings arranged by the county agent's office. "The poultry business is built on the commercial egg business. The commercial egg man must succeed before the hatchery and the poultry breeder can succeed," said Mr. Cosby.

Oregon has solved the egg marketing problem through cooperative pooling for sale. High quality eggs are increasing consumption and our marketing agencies are looking after the maintaining of this high quality. Oregon eggs are sold in competition with eggs from all over the country, 700 carloads of surplus eggs from this state are being shipped east annually. Marketing eggs from the Oregon poultry farms has become more than a grocery swapping and huckster selling proposition. The commercial producer is now in position to profit from the development of this phase of the business.

tonics and promiscuous poultry peddlers came in for some attention from Mr. Cosby. Many worm powders and medicines that are sold generally are good and entirely effective when used for the purpose intended. However, these should not be given flocks while in good production as such use invariably means a slump in production. A pan of sheep dip near the entrance to the premises through which visitors would be required to walk would save the poultryman trouble with disease, and allow the operator more time for his business. Poultry diseases are frequently spread by travelers from ranch to ranch and care should be taken to prevent this spread.

Increasing the size of the flock up to 1500 or 2500 hens is necessary to put the business on a man-sized scale. A 700 or 800 hen flock does not provide steady employment for the owner. Only by making it a full time business can the operator hope to make a satisfactory income and provide for old age. "There is not a poultry expert in captivity" said Mr. Cosby. The poultry business is changing too fast and developing too rapidly for experts to develop. "Breeding has produced the 300 egg hen. Sanitation and feeding must accompany breeding to get results. Pullets must grow. Things that upset and retard poultry development must be avoided. It is not reasonable to expect high production from pullets that have been undeveloped and go into the laying house in poor flesh."
