of the U. S. anxious to make new
homes filed patents on 4,612,722 acres
of public land in 1929. More than
30,000 persons have filed land claims
during the present year, while the
government derived \$6,000,000 from
this source. The greatest part of
this, of course, came through leases

on lands on which there are oil wells
or mines. But the fact that 30,000
people secured homes from Uncle
Sam in the past 12 months is enough
to show that all the good things
haven't been snapped up yet. And
the fact that many millions of acres
will be awarded to homesteaders in
the years to come ought to be of in-
terest to the man who often feels he
would like to go back to the days of
his forefathers, even though he
might have to do so minus the cov-
ered wagon and the flint-lock rifle.
