The world, thank heaven, is comfortably full of inherently lazy souls who cringe and shudder inwardly when brought into intimate contact with those fearfully energetic personages whose physical mechanisms seem run by electric dynamos.

Everyone knows the type of person meant—the fellow who, instead of burying his head under the pillow or sleepily stuffing the alarm clock under the blankets in hopes of one more snooze in the cold gray dawn bounds briskly out of bed at the first tinkle of the buzzer. Once up, he grimly seizes a pair of dumb bells starts the phonograph and proceeds to get himself all red and sweaty trying to carry out someone's idea of reducing to music.

After the monkey drill is over, he skips light-heartedly into a cold shower where he grits his teeth Spartan like and consoles himself with the thought that, after all, it is good for him. Then a shave, eggs, toast, coffee—and a little later, he breezes into the office, exuding vim, vigor and vitality to the extreme discomfort of all the lazy souls thereabouts.

Athletic faddists have for so long laid down that particular formula as being the only one method for a conscientious citizen to start the day, that it puts the mark of shame upon those subscribing to any other method of procedure.

Disciples of the cat method of wakening are legion, but they keep so quiet about their degenerate tendencies along that line that one is likely to forget or overlook their existence. This is the class who, after a certain amount of outside stimuli has been applied, opens first one eye and then, after an interval, the other; yawns, stretches one arm or leg, yawns again and

then stretches the other. At the end of a more or less protracted period of dozing and stretching, he manages to get his feet on the floor and then slumps there, stretching and yawning some more, while reflecting sourly upon a world where people have to get up of mornings, poor slaves.

A sleepy shuffle to the bathroom for a shave and a bath, which starts in with luke-warm water and ends up just comfortably cool, puts enough life into the old organism to get its feet under the breakfast table. Not until the coffee and toast have disappeared, however, is he really wide awake.

This regime is followed fairly closely by the majority of our fellow humans of both sexes, but, because of the stigma attached to the un-Spartan laziness of such a program, no one admits it unless he is compelled to. The virulently athletic boys are the ones who broadcast their personal habits to the wide world.

To incurable sleepy-heads, as well as to those who are averse to exercise except in comfortably moderate doses, the recent words of two learned men, will be as welcome as an oasis in a desert.

Dr. Josse F. Williams, physical education professor at Columbia University, is virulently attacking the strenuous manner of beginning the day. He scornfully labels setting-up exercises as ridiculous and criminal, says cold baths when first awakening are injurious, brands the alarm clock as a work of the devil. Furthermore, he comes out strongly for the feline manner of re-establishing one's contact with the early morning world.

Close upon the heels of his announcement, came the words of Jean Nathan, who, writing in the Outlook Magazine, insists that human muscles don't need much exercise of any kind and certainly not strenuous exertion. He says, "Walking, pushing open doors and closing windows, getting in and out of taxicabs, waving one's hand at friends across the street—that is enough exercise for anyone."

This, by the way, is a constructive step toward making the world safe for the lazy man, which it is far from being at the present time.

BABIES AND PIGS

The government recently put out two pamphlets that are in great demand. One of them tells how to bring up babies and the other gives instructions on how to raise pigs. Up recently, according to a Washington newspaper, the pig book was in greatest demand. But lately calls for the book on baby raising have increased so it looks as though American families will eventually become as much interested in bringing up children as they are in making fat hogs out of little pigs. When that time comes there will be little use for prisons, police and poor-houses—institutions that are now necessary largely because too many people devote their time to raising pigs when they should be devoting more of it to raising their children.

LOOKING AHEAD

Where is the resident who doesn't wonder along about this time of year just what the coming twelve months hold in store in the way of new and wonderful inventions? Right at the outset we read that Thos. A. Edison says he hopes before 1930 is ended to give to the world a substitute for rubber, and that it will come through utilizing the goldenrod, which grows in great abundance in many states. If we get nothing else but that—the discovery of a substitute for rubber—we will have cause for rejoicing. Rubber has come to be a very necessary part of our daily life, and something we really couldn't get along without. It may not be good news to Great Britain, for she has a monopoly on it and has for years had us in her grasp. But it ought to cause rejoicing in this country and it ought to bring a nation-wide hope that Mr. Edison's scheme works out 100 per cent successfully.

The telephone wire used in furnishing telephone service in Portland, would stretch one and a third to the moon. In all, there are 337,201 miles of telephone wire in the city. The distance to the moon is approximately 238,840 miles.

If the transmission wire in the Bell System were to be divided proportionately there would be half a mile of wire for every man, woman and child in the United States.

Chicago from a telephone standpoint is now no further from Portland than Salem or Astoria. The two cities were recently connected by a direct telephone circuit, 2500 miles in length. Calls will now go directly through to the Windy City without being routed through transfer points, as before. Other cities joined to Portland by direct circuit during 1929 were Los Angeles and Vancouver, B. C.
