### TELEPHONE COMPANY INCREASE STOCKHOLDERS

More than 469,000 stockholders  
participated Wednesday, January 15,  
in the receipt of the 161st dividends  
of the American Telephone and Tele-  
graph company. This is an increase  
of 14,000 stockholders in the past  
three-month period.

A wider distribution of the stock  
of the American company—which has  
the largest number of stockholders  
of any corporation in the world—is  
shown by the fact that the average  
number of shares held by each stock-  
holder decreased from 29.0 of Sep-  
tember, 1929, to 28.2. No one indi-  
vidual holds as much as 1 per cent of  
the stock.

### BRIDE CAN TEST SHEETING BY GRADE

For the modern bride, or bride-to-  
be, who hasn't time to hem wide  
sheets and make pillow cases by  
hand, the January white sales offer  
great opportunities, providing she  
knows how to distinguish between a  
real bargain and merely a cheap  
piece of material.

The first thing considered by most  
women when buying sheets is dura-  
bility. Good sheeting feels firm, but  
so does cheap sheeting which has  
been filled with starch or other  
dressing to give it this appearance.  
The test is to rub the material be-  
tween the hands to see if the firm-  
ness vanishes, and whether the rub-  
bing loosens a fine white powder,  
which is the starch or dressing used.  
A sheet which contains no dressing  
is called a "pure finish" sheet, and is  
usually so labeled.

Other important points to observe  
are size, smoothness and uniformity  
of threads, say the specialist. The  
number of warp and filling threads  
is also important. There are usually  
more warp threads—running parallel  
with the selvage—than filling threads  
but if the difference is great, the  
sheet is apt to split in the direction  
having fewest threads. Good sheet-  
ing, when stretched tightly between  
the hands, shows even, closely woven  
threads, with no knots.

Size is another important consid-  
eration in buying sheeting, and here  
opinions differ as to the desirable  
amount to allow for tucking in at  
sides, top and bottom. The most sat-  
isfactory allowance, however, seems  
to be from 14 to 18 inches at each  
end and 14 inches at each side.  
Sheets that are too short or too nar-  
row are bound to be unsatisfactory  
and, therefore, poor economy.

### WHERE WOOD GOES

Most residents around here would  
say that more wood goes into mak-  
ing lumber than for any other pur-  
pose. Some might guess furniture  
or pulp, a substance from which all  
our paper products are made. But  
notwithstanding the consumption of  
coal and gas and electricity, more  
wood is burned for fuel than for  
any other purpose, according to a  
bulletin sent out by the N. Y. State  
college of Forestry.

A block 500 feet long and 500 feet  
wide and 38,000 feet high represents  
the wood burned for fuel each year.  
Such a pile would be twice as high  
as the highest mountain in the world.  
Lumber comes next to firewood, and  
wood for fencing ranks third on the  
list. Railroads ties are next and  
piled in a square block of 500 feet  
each way they would reach higher  
than the tallest building in the world.  
Wood used for paper ranks fifth on  
the list and then comes furniture.

Considering that wood not only  
furnishes material for a vast majority  
of homes but also serves to keep a  
vast majority of the people of the U.  
S. from freezing to death inside  
those homes, isn't it a wonder we  
don't wake up to the importance of  
conserving every tree, and planting  
more trees every year? It strikes us  
that every school teacher in America  
can find in this subject a valuable  
lesson for our boys and girls, and  
that a nation-wide movement for tree  
planting on a greater scale than ever  
known would be one of the most  
valuable things this country could  
carry out during 1930.

### OREGON STATE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TO FINISH SURVEY IN 1930

New and complete facts and data  
surveys of Oregon's 36 counties and  
922 cities and towns will be com-  
pleted during 1930 by the Oregon  
State Chamber of Commerce. Com-  
pletion of the surveys is a part of  
the state-wide program of "Build  
Oregon!" being conducted by the  
State Chamber this year.

The data compiled will serve as a  
basis for the publication of literature  
and national advertising on the state  
Industrial facts and data surveys of  
the larger cities of the state will also  
be made in cooperation with the local  
chambers.

Every phase of the State Cham-  
ber's activities in attracting settlers,  
tourists and investors to Oregon  
is based on facts and accurate infor-  
mation and by bringing all the  
data about Oregon up to date we  
hope to strengthen and increase our  
results and activities.

Forms for the surveys are now  
being completed. A corps of work-  
ers are to be employed to collect  
and correlate the information.

### HOME POINTERS

From the School of Home Economics  
A tablespoon of honey added to  
each serving of grapefruit gives a  
pleasant flavor.

Cream puff shells filled with fish  
or chicken salad make a delightful  
party refreshment. For another  
variation, they may be filled with  
ice cream and served with hot choco-  
late sauce for dessert.

When the apples intended for  
frying with ham or bacon are color-  
less, a few "redhots"—the little red  
cinnamon candies—may be stirred in  
to add both flavor and color to the  
apples.

New, different and delicious is the  
dish created by the use of maple-  
flavored syrup and nut meats in  
making candied sweet potatoes. To  
prepare this, cook the syrup down  
slowly with the nutmeats until it al-  
most reaches the candy stage, then  
pour it over the sweet potatoes,  
which have been boiled, peeled and  
cut in thick slices.

When making a puffy omelet, best  
results are obtained by beating the  
egg whites and yolks separately, be-  
ing careful not to beat the whites  
too much, as they do not blend as  
well with the yolks when too dry.

### FARM POINTERS

The campaign to eradicate the  
Mediterranean fruit fly has been  
more successful than scientists had  
even hoped, report Don C. Mote,  
entomologist of the Oregon Experi-  
ment station. Although the fly is  
now found only in citrus fruits in  
this country, it prefers deciduous  
fruits in its native habitat. Oregon  
growers are backing the present cam-  
paign for complete eradication.

Of all ordinary farm products sub-  
ject to spontaneous heating or com-  
bustion, hay has been found the most  
susceptible. Oats are also readily  
combustible. Burlap bags, especially  
if they have contained nitrate of  
soda and have been washed and  
stored in piles where ventilation is  
poor, are subject to danger. Condi-  
tions under which spontaneous heat-  
ing may develop are generally those  
where farm products are put in stor-  
age too immature, poorly cured, or  
where they may get wet while in  
storage.

### Disease Specialist Named

A new associate plant pathologist  
for the Oregon Experiment station,  
Dr. F. P. McWhorter of the Virginia  
Truck Experiment station, has just  
been appointed to succeed Prof. M.  
B. McKay who has resigned after 14  
years of service in this state. Dr.  
McWhorter's experience is said to fit  
him well for carrying on the out-  
standing research done by McKay in  
diseases of potatoes, vegetable crops  
and bulbs.

Professor McKay has resigned to  
devote his time to commercial bulb  
production.

### Horse-Meat Sausage Exposed

It has long been an axiom that  
meat consigned to sausage had lost  
its identity completely, but now  
modern science has changed even this.  
Oregon state college veterinary special-  
ists have just proved by means of  
blood tests on rabbits that horse meat  
was being used in "pork" sausage by  
a Portland firm. The proof was so  
conclusive that the firm never even  
contested revoking of its license by  
the state and city health departments
