A. M. Janssen Announces Intention to Run for State Representative

Alfred M. Janssen, of Reedville, has announced his intention to be a candidate for state representative from Washington county at the primary election in May.

Mr. Janssen was born in Clinton Iowa, February 2, 1885. He spent practically all of his boyhood and young manhood on an Iowa farm. He was married November 16, 1914, to Ruby McConnell at Vancouver, Wash. Mrs. Janssen is a

native of Mayville, Oregon. They have two boys, one ten and the other four.

During the war he tried his luck at homesteading in Montana for three years, but found it necessary to follow his trade of well drilling on the side in order to make a living.

The Janssens have made their home in this county for the past nine years, the last eight at Reedville. He has been in the well drilling business all the time, starting with one small machine and incorporating last fall. His company has six machines now, including an oil drilling rig. He is a member of the Masons, including York rite bodies and Shrine. He is a charter member of the Washington County Rod and Gun club.

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Examination for Postmaster at Beaverton

To fill the vacancy in the position of postmaster in Beaverton the United States Civil Service Commission has announced at the request of the Postmaster General and in accordance with an order of the President an open competitive examination.

To be eligible for the examination, an applicant must be a citizen of the United States must reside within the delivery of the postoffice for which the examinations is held, must have so resided for at least two years next preceding the date for close of receipt of applications, must be in good physical condition, and within the prescribed age limits. Both men and women are admitted.

Under the terms of the Executive order, the Civil Service Commission will certify to the Postmaster General the names of the highest three qualified eligibles, if as many as three are qualified, and the Postmaster General will select one for nomination by the President. Confirmation by the Senate is the final action.

Applicant will be required to assemble in an examination room for scholastic tests, and will also be rated on their education and business training and experience. The civil service commission will make inquiry among representative local business and professional men and women concerning the experience, ability, and character of each applicant, and will assign ratings upon the evidence secured and upon the work done in the examination room.

Nothing will be permitted to appear in the evidence upon which ratings are assigned which might even suggest the political affiliation of any candidate.

Full information and application blanks may be obtained at the post office for which the examination is held or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

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Geo. W. Lippert Files As Candidate for County Judgeship

Geo. W. Lippert, of Aloha, announces his candidacy for the office of County Judge for Washington County. He was born in Wisconsin in the year 1885, attended the grade schools there, worked his way through Wisconsin University by doing odd jobs, and was graduated from the Law School of that university in 1914. Thereafter he was engaged in the practice of law in that state.

Mr. Lippert was admitted to the practice of law in the Wisconsin Supreme Court in 1914, was admitted to practice in the Federal Courts the same year, and in 1920 was admitted to practice before the United States Supreme Court, Washington, D. C., the highest court of the land. The American Blue Book of Wisconsin Attorneys says of him: "Mr. Lippert is a good speaker and few men of his age and experience at the Bar have gained a more favorable standing." And the biographical edition of Wisconsin, Its History and People says of him: "Among his fellow practitioners he is recognized as a lawyer of high attainment."

He has been associated with business more or less all his life. At one time he owned an interest in a mercantile business, then traveled for the National Biscuit Company, and he is now associated with H. A. Lowry in the Aloha Mercantile Company. He is the owner of a large White Leghorn ranch near Aloha.

He is president of the Aloha Community club and is also president of the United West Side Clubs, an affiliation of some forty community clubs interested in the promotion of the people of the Tualatin valley. As such president he has taken a keen active interest in the welfare of the people of the valley—especially those of Washington County.

In the Fall of 1929, Mr. Lippert won the silver cup awarded by the State Fair association, at Salem, in the Oratorical Contest. He was adjudged the best speaker there. If he should decide to make an active speaking campaign, as is intimated that he will do, the voters of Washington County may expect to hear things of interest.

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C. A. Haulenbeck Passes Away Saturday Noon

C. A. Haulenbeck, 83, died at the hospital in Hillsboro, Saturday noon following a prolonged illness.

Private funeral services were held at W. E. Pegg's chapel Friday. Final arrangements, to ship the body to Manhattan, Kansas, have been completed. Mrs. Haulenbeck will leave Sunday with the remains.

Mr. Haulenbeck was born in New York, April 9, 1847. A good part of his life has been spent in the lumber business, having owned several sawmills. Before coming to Oregon he was the postmaster at Canton, Kansas, for a number of years.

About 20 years ago Mr. Haulenbeck moved his family from Manhattan, Kansas, settling at North Plains where he built a mill. Finally he sold his mill and came to Beaverton and erected the planing mill on the property on Broadway at the O. E. tracks. His last bit of construction was the erection of the three store buildings on the same land.

Mr. Haulenbeck's greatest hobby was violins, which he made himself. Some of these are being used by noted violinists who praise the handiwork highly.

Following his marriage to Cassie E. Glasgow at Manhattan, Kansas, six children were born, Mary, Frank and Arthur, (deceased) and Mrs. E. M. Johnston, Texas, George, Texas, and John of Beaverton.

He was a member of the Masonic lodge, an I. O. O. F. and a member of the Christian church. His quiet unassuming disposition made him many friends, both young and old.

Oregonian Carrier Delivers Papers Thru Worst of Weather

CITY COUNCIL HOLDS SPECIAL MEETING THURSDAY EVENING

Mr. Clark of State Highway Commission Frame Two Propositions for City Council

The city council were hurriedly summoned for a special meeting Thursday evening, to make a decision on where to move the present city hall building. The structure is in the direct path of the new highway to connect with the Canyon road. The contractors hope to commence work on this stretch of road soon, and the right-of-way must be cleared.

Mr. Clark, of the State Highway Commission was present, together with J. W. DeSouza, and suggested that the city hall be moved on the A. E. Story lot, which connects with the present location. He continued, by explaining the commission would allow 7c a foot for the 4460 square feet of property now occupied. This would allow the city \$312.20, as well as having the state bear the expense of moving the building.

Mayor Erickson extended the suggestion that the city secure a piece of property nearer the business district, where there would be enough land left for a fire station. Mr. Clark then informed the council that the state would move the building to any location within the city limits. Councilman Alexander asked that the city be given five days in which to reach a definite decision, which was readily granted.

A motion, after being framed by Mr. Clark, of the highway commission, was made by Councilman Talbert and seconded by Councilman Alexander.

The council by February 5th, will have reached a decision in the matter for the best interests of the town of Beaverton.
