Thompson & Dubey's quarters were finished last week in the new Weinhard Automobile building and the shop opened for business on the main floor corner at 12th and Couch streets.

L. A. Thompson and J. A. Dubey, owners, have 100 by 100 feet space. They have installed the latest equipment for brake, springs, wheel alignment and shock absorber service.

The company has been in business here four years, operating quarters at 20th and Washington streets and in the Rotoway Auto Laundry. The latter is discontinued with the new station.

A cowdry four-wheel brake tester and a Jumbo machine for the same purpose, with a wheel-o-meter, are among new installations. The space is well lighted and has big windows on two sides, with two 20ft entrances and one 12 ft entrance. A rest room has been furnished for women, and special quarters for mechanics, which includes a shower and wash

room.

Special pits augment hydraulic elevators for spring and shock absorber work. Parts are shelved in a special room in the pit. The firm is authorized for Bendix brake service and is authorized service store and distributor for Gabriel shock absorbers and Pines automotive winter radiator covers.

Offices of the firm occupy the south border of the shop. A lounge will be furnished for motorists awaiting service.

Summons For Publication

Awarding to the plaintiff the sum of nineteen hundred and 00-100 Dollars (\$1,900.00) with interest thereon at the rate of ten (10) per cent per annum from the 23rd day of May, 1929, the further sum of two hundred and 00-100 Dollars (200.00) attorney's fees; and for costs and disbursements incurred herein; that the whole of the said judgement be declared a valid and subsisting lien in the said premises; that the plaintiff's mortgage be foreclosed according to law and the said property be ordered sold in the manner provided for by statute for the sale of real property on execution; that the proceeds of said sale be applied to the payments of the sums due the plaintiff and costs of sale, and that the defendants and all persons claiming under them subsequent to the execution of the plaintiff's mortgage upon the premises, either as purchasers or encumbrancers, or otherwise, be barred and foreclosed from all rights or claims to said premises, save the equity of redemption, as provided for by the laws of the State of Oregon; that the plaintiff have judgement and execution against the defendants, E.
