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Declamation Contest Finals Scheduled For April 18th

The final declamation contest for the grade schools of Washington county will be held at Hillsboro, in the Christian church, opposite Cady's garage at 1:30 p. m. April 18.

Classes have been divided into three divisions, first the third and fourth grades with selections from 100 to 300 words; second, fifth and sixth with 200 to 450 words, and third, seventh and eighth grades, 350 to 600 words. Complete plainly written or typed copies of all selections to be used in the final contest must be filed in the county superintendent's office before April 15.

No student having won first place in previous contests will be eligible to enter in the same division.

In the preliminary contests each division is entitled to one dramatic and one humorous selection and the winners are qualified to compete in the finals.

Following are the four sections as mapped out:

Section 1. Hillsboro and Forest Grove. No preliminaries.

Section 2. Six- to eight-teacher schools. Districts 23, 48, 107. Preliminary at Beaverton to eliminate one contestant in each group.

Section 3. Three and four-teacher

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schools, Districts 2, 10, 14 Jt., 13, 31, 78. Preliminary at Corvallis. Districts 82, 88, 92, 106, 26 Jt. Preliminary at Sherwood.

Section 4. One and two-teacher schools. Western preliminary at Watts Dist. 27, Mamie Sandy, Forest Grove, Star Rt. Northern preliminary at North Plains Dist. 70, E. R. Chamberlain, N. Plains. Eastern preliminary at Progress Dist. 18, Annie M. Vose, Oswego. Central preliminary at Sherwood. Dora Anderson, Sherwood, and Mrs. Ida Kays, Hillsboro, Rt.

Schools in group 4 should notify the manager of the section of the preliminary where they wish to enter as soon as possible.

The date set for the preliminaries is April 11. If the managers of any of the sections think best to hold their preliminary at an earlier date or Saturday, the 12th, they may do so.

Each section will compete in the finals, only with schools of its own group.

Ribbons will be awarded to each section separately. The basis of scoring is: Interpretation, 50 points; enunciation, 30 points; memory, 20 points.

County Field Meet to Be At Hillsboro May 3rd

The Washington county grade school track and field meet will be held on the Hillsboro union high school athletic field on Saturday, May 3.

Preliminary elimination contests shall be held at the centers designated below on Saturday, April 19.

All contestants shall be regularly enrolled pupils of the grade schools of Washington county and shall have a general average of 80 per cent, including application and deportment.

Each school shall be entitled to two contestants in each event in the preliminary contest.

Contestants winning first and second places in the preliminary contests shall be eligible to enter the final contest. Alternates may be selected if necessary from the school having the contestant.

No boy or girl may enter more than two track events or more than three events in all, either in preliminaries or in the final. Relays are counted as track events.

Contestants are classified on a basis of age and weight. Age at last birthday in months plus present weight in pounds and divide by two gives "age-weight." Example, age 12 years, weight 100 pounds, 144 plus 100 equals 244, divided by 2 equals 122 pounds, age weight.

Class 1. Boys age weight, 130 pounds or over. Girls age weight, 115 pounds or over.

Class 2. Boys age weight, under 130 pounds. Girls age weight, under 115 pounds.

Events—Class 1. Boys 130 pounds or over, age weight: 50-yd. dash, 100-yd. dash, 440-yd. relay of four, pole vault, high jump, and 8-pound shot.

Class 1. Girls 115 pounds or over, age weight: 50-yd. dash, 75-yd. dash, 220 relay of four, baseball throw for distance, baseball throw for accuracy.

Class 2. Boys under 130 pounds, age weight: 50-yd. dash, 75-yd. dash, 220 relay of four, pole vault, high jump, broad jump, baseball throw for distance.

Class 2. Girls under 115 pounds, age weight. Same as Class 1. In the baseball throw for accuracy, girls of both classes, the distance from pitcher's box to dummy shall be thirty feet. The opening in the dummy shall be three feet in height and 18 inches in width and 18 inches high from the ground. Five throws allowed each contestant. Anything that goes through the opening shall be considered a strike or score.

Suitable ribbons will be awarded for first, second and third places in each event. Schools will be awarded penants for first, second and third place in the total number of points won. Each first place counts five points, second place three points and third place one point.

Ribbons and penants are presented by the Hillsboro Chamber of commerce.

The teachers will please notify the managers of the centers in which it will be most convenient for them to participate in the preliminary meets. This must be done one week before the preliminary meet. The managers will immediately forward a copy of winners in the preliminary meets to the county school superintendent.

Candidacy for Governor Formally Announced By Charles Hall

Charles Hall of Marshfield, state senator from Coos and Curry counties, formally announced his candidacy throughout Oregon today for governor at the primaries, May 15. Mr. Hall said he would file with Secretary of State Hoss within the next few days.

At the same time Mr. Hall announced that he would support very definite statewide policies, including highway program completion, reorganization of state government, economy in state government and re-adjustment of tax assessments. The senator pledged himself to support conservation of fish and game resources. He said that if elected he would favor state-wide enforcement of the prohibition laws, which he

characterized as "executive problem requiring eternal vigilance."

Mr. Hall's platform calls for a uniting of all forces in the state looking toward Oregon's development.

Friends of Mr. Hall in urging that he make the race have pointed to his business and political record as one which well qualifies him for the office of governor.

Starting without resources at 21, when he came here from western Pennsylvania, Mr. Hall in 28 years has successfully engaged in the drug, orchard, telephone and banking businesses. In the latter fields he has operated large enterprises from which he only recently sold his control.

For three terms he has been state senator. In community and statewide chamber of commerce work he has been very active. As chairman of the roads and highways committee in the senate when major construction was begun, he has had a vital part in road development.

Hall's supporters indicated that his extensive business experience well qualified him for the many executive duties of the governor.

Mr. Hall and Mrs. Hall, who make their home at Marshfield, have two girls and two boys, all of whom are now in public school or university.

Senator Hall's campaign organization will center in Portland where offices were opened last week. Mr. Hall himself will be active throughout the state up to the time of the primary.

Workers have been in the field some time and additional men and women from the Hall organization will go out during the month.

A Hall-for-Governor club with representatives in all the principal towns in Oregon is soon to be formed, according to the Hall organization leaders.
