STRAWBERRY ROOT WEEVIL APPEARING

One family of the strawberry root weevil adult has already appeared in the Hillsboro locality. This small black beetle collects about the base of the strawberry plants and in the top layer of soil.

Commercial baits made up of a combination of apple and poison may be purchased, or bran baits can be used as recommended by the Oregon Agricultural College. A teaspoonful of this bait is placed in the crown of each plant when these adults appear. It is necessary to poison the adult soon after its appearances as they are said to start laying eggs within a few days after that time. The bran bait is prepared as follows: Bran, five pounds; molasses one pint; calcium arsenate, four ounces; and water, two quarts; mix thoroughly.
