Mrs. A. G. Persel and son of Portland, visited at the Page home last week.

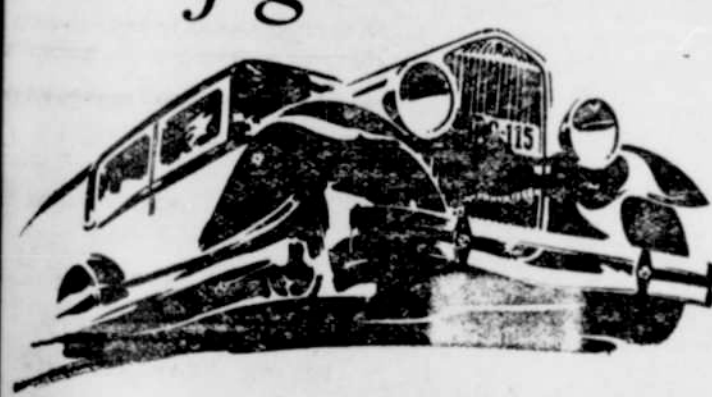
Mrs. H. A. Lowry was returned to her home Sunday from a hospital much improved.
