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ANNUAL CLEANUP DAY WILL BE NEXT TUESDAY JUNE 10

Recorder asks Permission to
Mail Notices Each Month
to Water Users

BILLS ORDERED PAID
Decide to let State Highway
Commissioner Move City
Hall as Agreed

Beaverton's Annual Cleanup Day
has been set by Mayor Erickson,
for next Tuesday June 10th. This
gives everyone a chance to gather
together all rubbish, tin cans, etc.,
on their premises and put them in
bags ready for the city trucks
which will be available all day to
haul it away.

Recorder Dietsch asked permission
of the council to send water notices
to users each month. After con-
siderable discussion the opinion pre-
vailed that the additional ex-
pense of material and postage would
be compensated by a more prompt
payment of bills. Finally an agree-
ment was reached to send notices to
those users behind in payments.
Councilman Wilson then made a
motion, that the recorder be in-
structed to secure prices on print-
ing the notices and order them
Councilman Talbert amended the
motion by adding, that a figure on
printing 10,000 notices be secured,
Wilson seconded it.

The recorder was also instructed
to send notices to property owners,
whose tenants had failed to take
care of the water bills for a pe-
riod of 90 days. This is permissible
through ordinance No. 88 of Sec-
tion 18, which states: "All charges
for furnishing water within the Town
of Beaverton, shall be chargeable to
the premises where the water is
supplied."

The moving of the old fire car
house demanded some attention and
decision was reached to make some
additions and alterations, after the
house is moved and use it to house
the fire truck.

Bunker Ready to Start Road Work

The contractor, doing work on the
new road for the state highway
commission, has leased the Hallen-
beck, property near the O. E. track
to use as a storage point. A bun-
ker, has been built that is 40 feet
high, 32 feet long and 14 feet
wide, and has a capacity of eight
carloads of sand and two sizes of
gravel. A sixty foot conveyor will
carry the sand and gravel from a
hopper 10 feet deep built beneath a
spur track at the rate of one yard
a minute. The sand and gravel will
be weighed by a machine fitted on
the bunker, before it is loaded into
the trucks.

It is expected nine car loads a day
will be run out and a crew of
thirty-five men and twelve trucks
will be used, just as soon as the
Beaverton section of the Tualatin
highway is started. The highway is
to be completed by September.

I. L. Young is the contractor and
Harry Devereaux the superintendent
in charge of the work.
