Eugene Bishop, oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. M. Frank Bishop, has been chosen manager of the Stanford Daily of the Stanford University. This is one of the coveted positions and highest honors at this great school. Eugene is a graduate of the Tigard Public School and the Beaverton High School. His attainment of this high position is the result of his characteristic hard work, and fully justifies the confidence and expectations of his parents and friends. Eugene Bishop was officially named as business manager of the Stanford Daily, for next year at a meeting of the business staff held last night. Bishop's appointment was approved by the Executive Committee Tuesday when the recommendations of the Publications Council were passed.

In the fall of 1928 Bishop began work on the business staff. A year later in 1929, when he was junior, he was promoted to the position of advertising manager. Part of the year he supervised Palo Alto advertising and this spring he has taken charge of San Francisco commercial publicity. Bishop is a member of Sigma Nu fraternity.

Appointment on the Quad staffs and election of the editor of the Daily will be passed upon by the Ex. Committee at its final meeting of the year, Tuesday, May 27.
