L. Young of Marshfield. Young submitted the lowest bid of \$181,422.97 for this type of paving. Resident of Washington county were well represented, and said it would be a mistake to use anything but concrete.

Mr. Young also has the contract from the state for paving the road in Washington county, connecting with the Canyon road.

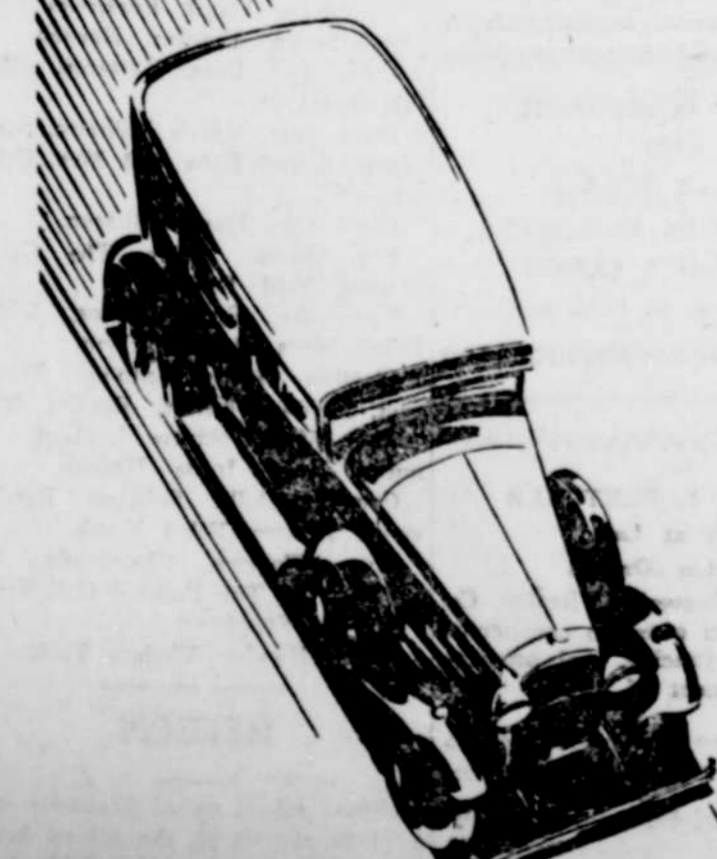
