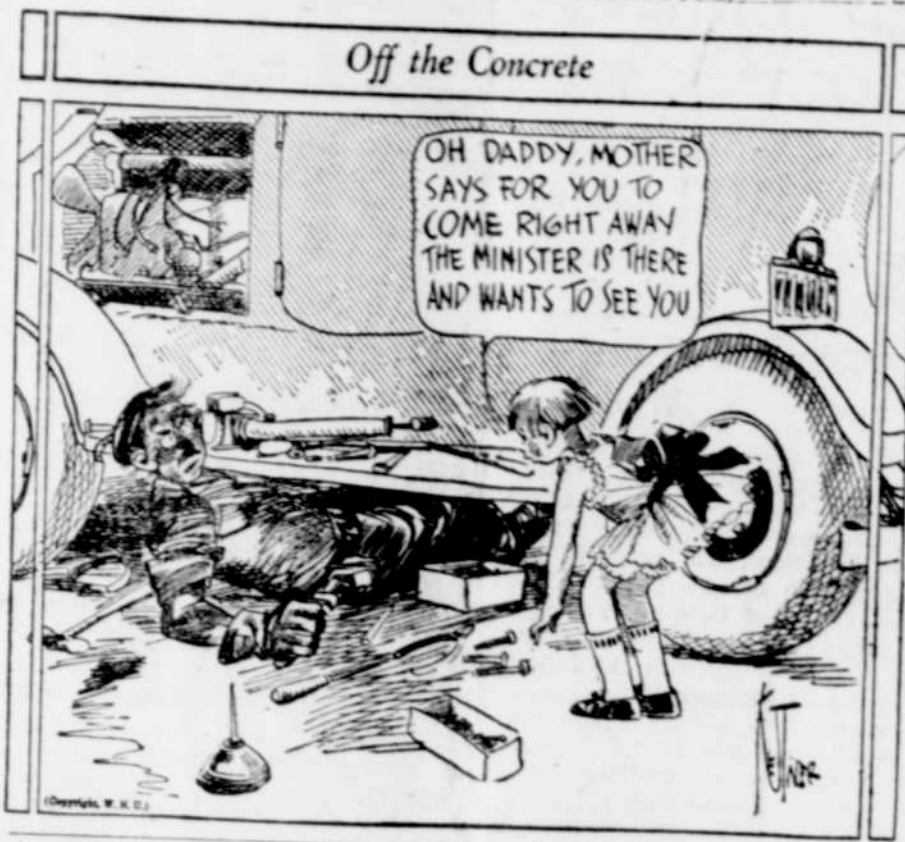

## GEO. W. JOSEPH SPEAKS AT UNITED WESTSIDE CLUB MEETING

Legion Hall Packed Beyond Capacity to Hear the Nominee for Governor

ENJOYABLE PROGRAM

Next Meeting, July 8th, to Be Held at Maplewood

Geo. W. Joseph, Republican nominee for governor, was the principal speaker at the meeting of the United West Side clubs which was held at Forest Grove Tuesday evening, in the Legion Memorial hall. In his speech he outlined the development of the Columbia river to maintain cheap water power, the abolition of the public service commission and the right of free speech. Senator Joseph stated he did not criticize the personnel of the public service commission but the fact that they had been given a task impossible for a group of men to perform.

In regards to the development of the Columbia river, he stated that no state or county could advance without a large population, and that a population is drawn to a state only by its ability to furnish employment in factories and furnish sufficient raw material to keep the industries moving.

Mr. Joseph was introduced by Dr. O. H. Holmes, of Forest Grove, ex state senator.

The hall was packed to capacity people coming from all parts of Washington county and the surrounding counties.

Ben Riesland reported that the tunnel question had been practically settled, with a five million dollars pledged by New York bankers and the only draw back now is legal approval.

Milton Miller spoke in favor of a memorial highway and building at Champoz, and Albert Tozier, custodian of Champoz Memorial park suggested that the club go on record in favor of a resolution asking for the construction of the road.

The president of the clubs, Geo. W. Lippert, of Aloha, presided at the meeting and Omar Kendall of Forest Grove welcomed the visitors.

A most pleasing musical program was offered by Mrs. Frances Durant, at the piano, accompanied by the Misses Mildred Cornack, Helen Boyles and Phyllis Spelbring on the violin.

Miss Hazel Jenkins, of Garden Home, presented the "Seven Stenpers" in a juvenile vaudeville stunt and the Pacific University orchestra furnished the music.

Celebrities from Beaverton were Mayor Otto Erickson and the young ladies who participated in the queen contest on Beavertons float.

R. W. Reynolds, president of the Maplewood Chamber of Commerce, suggested the next meeting, which is dated for July 8th, be held at Maplewood. This received the unanimous vote of approval. Mr. Upson, executive secretary and other members of the "Uptown Portland Association" will be present with charts and information on the development of projects of interest to the United West Side Clubs.

## 31 Portland Firemen Reside Outside of City
