DAIRY TRAIN ENDS LONG OREGON TOUR

More than 15,610 View Most Successful Project of State

"The most successful tour ever made by a demonstration train in Oregon" was the general verdict passed upon the recent trip of the Dairy demonstration train which has completed a 16-stop schedule through northwestern and central Oregon under the auspices of the state college extension service and the S. P. & S. railroad.

The trip was most successful from the standpoint of attendance, but probably more important was its reception on the part of dairymen themselves who were generous in their praise of the practical nature of the exhibits and program features which emphasized the four points of economical production, higher quality, better marketing and increased consumption.

One of the important elements in the higher quality exhibits was the demonstration of refrigeration equipment in which cream put aboard the special at Corvallis was kept perfectly sweet for the entire 10-day tour. When sampled at Redmond after 250 hours at about 33 degrees temperature, it was pronounced still in perfect condition.

The campaign for better cows through use of good sires also came to a climax at Redmond when a local dairymen purchased the Jersey bull carried along in the demonstration herd. This bull was from the C. C. Dickson bull at Shedd and brought \$225.

Redmond won honors for attendance with 2727. This included close to 1000 granagers there for the state meeting. Hillsboro was second with 1532 and Albany third with 1346. Other attendance figures follow in order:

White Salmon 1040; Seaside, 1004; Eugene, 1003; Clatskanie, 949; Salem, 890; Forest Grove, 858; Vernonia, 815; Astoria 808; Rainier 786; Scappoose, 640; Donald 538; Wilsonville 478; and Portland 196. No regular meeting was held at Portland the cars merely being open two hours for visitors.

Co-Operative Dairy Association to Erect Plant at Clatskanie

The Brookfield construction company of Astoria has been awarded the contract to build the new plant of the Lower Columbia River Co-operative Dairy Assn. at Clatskanie which is to be completed by September 5th. This is the second plant to be constructed by the association under the federal farm loan it received a few months ago. The other plant, which has already been started, is located at Grays River, Wash., will be ready for use late this summer. With the completion of these two units the association will have five production plants. Enough cows have been contracted for to supply both new plants.

Success of Dairy Cooperative Assured

Director, Louie Managie of the Dairyman's Cooperative Ass'n. in his talk before an enthusiastic meeting at North Plains, Friday night, stated that the organization now has more than 750 signers and that its success is now assured. Mr. Managie was a director in the Greater American Dairy Association that dissolved to affiliate with the Dairyman's Cooperative Assn. He operates a 1000 acre ranch on Sauvies Island and milks 80 cows.

The meeting resulted in a good number of signers. Dairymen throughout the county are working with their neighbors with the result much expense and time are being saved the organization.

Two more meetings are scheduled for next week. Monday, June 23, a meeting will be held in the union schoolhouse west of Cedar Mills. Thursday, June 26, in the Farmington school house north of Farmington Dairymen are urged to attend these meetings as a means of spreading up the organization work.
