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Cornerstone Laid at St. Marys of the Valley

Sunday, July 6th marked another milestone in the career of the Sisters of St. Mary. On this day the nuns celebrated an event for which they have labored and waited for, through many long years. It was the laying of the cornerstone of their new convent home and Academy. Forty-four years ago ten Sisters laid the foundation of this community of religious teachers—a community destined to teach the children of Oregon in the various parochial schools of the Archdiocese. Seven of these ten were able to participate in the triumph of the day.

The procession, led by the St. Mary's high school band, left the Institute grounds at 2:30 P. M., and marching to the stirring strains of Anacoda, arranged by Roland F. Seitz, proceeded to the site of the new building. Following the band came the boys from St. Mary's Home, the girls from the Academy, the members of the Community and the visiting religious, and the many relatives and friends of the Sisters. Bringing up the rear came His Grace, Most Rev. Edward D. Howard, Archbishop of Portland, and the clergy.

His Grace blessed the beautiful cornerstone upon which was engraved the significant dates 1886-1930, the motto of the Sisters: "Ora et Labora," and the inscription A. M. D. G. "For the greater glory of God." After the stone was fixed in place the band played the Star Spangled Banner. Thence the procession proceeded to the chapel which was blessed with appropriate ceremonies.

Thence the procession continued to the temporary altar, where Archbishop Howard delivered an inspiring sermon, depicting the life and character of the Sisterhood in general, and enlarging upon the work and influence of the Sisters of St. Mary in particular. He ended by thanking the nuns for their wonderful work in the cause of Christian education in Oregon. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament followed, and the crowd dispersed while the band played: "Our Defenders."

The Most Rev. Archbishop was assisted by Rev. John Commisky, O. S. B. and Rev. George Fallu, as deacon and subdeacon respectively. Rev. J. C. Heesaker was Cross-bearer, while the Rev. I. E. McNamee of St. Francis Parish, Portland, was the official Master of Ceremonies. Numbered among the visiting clergy were the following: Revs. J. C. Hughes, John Bernards, George Sniderhorn, Henry Orth, Theodore Bernards, Stanley Cregan, Vincent Koppert, O. S. B., Henry Pelletan, Marc Schmid, O. S. B., all of whom were the guests of the Sisters and the Chaplain Rev. Charles Seroski at the reception which completed the events of the day.

One of the happy features of the afternoon, and one not arranged by the Sisters, was carried out by Miss Marie Riddell, a former pupil of St. Mary's. Miss Riddell flew over the crowd in her plane, and swooping down to within 100 feet of the ground she timed her descent with such unerring accuracy that her bouquet of most beautiful rosebuds dropped in front of the altar. Enclosed was a card bearing her kindest wishes. Then circling the field once more to see that her bouquet was fittingly placed on the altar, she flew away to the city. It was a most delicate act of appreciation and rendered with the courteous spontaneity which is characteristic of Miss Riddell's dealing with her teachers.

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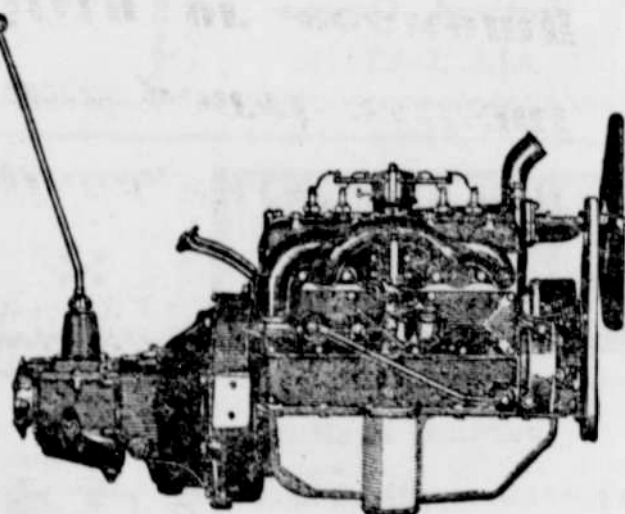
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
