Pioneer Couple Celebrates 71st Wedding Anniversary

Mr. and Mrs. John Cullen, of Glencullen, pioneers of Oregon, celebrated their 71st wedding anniversary on Monday at their home. Many messages were received from all parts of the country. The couple were wed in 1859, when Mr. Cullen was 21 and Mrs. Cullen 19. They raised 11 children, nine of which are still living and the oldest being past 60 years. They have 24 grandchildren and 16 great grandchildren. The story of the Cullens' frontier experiences is typical of pioneer life in Oregon. Mrs. Cullen is the only surviving member of the Applegate party which came West in 1843, when she was 3 years old. Mr. Cullen followed the Oregon Trail a few years later, arriving in Portland in 1848, a boy of 10. After their marriage, the Cullens lived for a time in Yamhill, later moving to Eastern Oregon, where he was a hardscrabble" Methodist preacher on Sundays and an Indian fighter the rest of the week. As one of the few survivors of the Indian wars he was recently named grand commander of the veterans' organization. Mr. and Mrs. Cullen have been invited to take part in the Salmon river cutoff celebration and historic pageant on July 19, and both are looking forward to the occasion. Mr. Cullen, who is 92 years old, says of his wife, who is 90, "A dutiful daughter, a faithful wife and an efficient pioneer mother." The couple live by themselves at Glencullen and seem to prefer to do so. Mr. Cullen being very busy with a history of the Indian wars.

Cow in Beaverton Herd Wins Silver Medal

Producing 590.70 pounds butterfat and 10881 pounds of milk in an official production test of 305 days, Lella's Gamboge Ella, pure-bred Jersey cow owned by J. J. Van Kleek & Sons of Beaverton, here, has won the American Jersey Cattle Club Silver medal award. This high producing Jersey cow was only 2 years, 2 months of age when started on test and made her creditable record on an average of less than three milkings per day. For eight consecutive months during the test she produces more than 50 pounds of butterfat per month; during the best month yielding 62.26 pounds of butterfat. J. J. Van Kleek & Sons owns a herd of pure-bred Jerseys which have won many honor for high production.

72 Boys and Girls of County Enroll in Calf Clubs

A total of 72 boys and girls of Washington County are enrolled in calf clubs, according to the statement of W. S. Averill, assistant county agent. Of this number 64 are members of standard clubs and 8 are classed as individual members. Calf club members are divided into 1st, 2nd and 3rd divisions. The first division number is a boy or girl who owns and cares for a heifer calf under 12 months of age. Division two is made up of owners of heifers over twelve months of age and not milking. Division three represents the owners of producing cows. In division one there are 43 members; in division two there are 21 members, and in division three there are 6 members.

Local leaders assume a great deal of responsibility and are entitled to much credit for the successful manner in which calf club work is carried on, says Mr. Averill. In order to have a standard club there must be five members owning stock in one or more of the three divisions. Officers including a president, vice-president and a secretary-treasurer must be elected from among members of the club.

There must be a definite program of work for each club meeting, and it is the responsibility of the club leader to see that this program is carried through the six regular meetings.

All members of the club exhibit their stock at least once during the year as well as being a member of a demonstration team making one or more public appearances. Demonstrations are given at community meetings and at county or state fairs. Each club selects a judging team of three members from among its membership. This team competes at the County fair, the winning team from the county fair competes at the State fair, the winning team from the State fair competes with like teams from northwest states at the Pacific International; the winner there is entitled to compete at the National Livestock Show at Chicago.

Members of livestock clubs have several chances to win prizes at the county and state fairs. Besides exhibiting their animals in the club classes, purebred animals may be shown in open competition. The Holstein breeders association of the county gives \$100 to each club member exhibiting a purebred Holstein animal worthy to be shown. The Jersey association plans to award a scholarship to the 4-H club member having a worthy Jersey calf project. The scholarship for 1929 was awarded to Kenneth Willis of Forest Grove.

The Forest Grove chamber of commerce in 1929 awarded to George Barkley, Jr., a scholarship to the 4-H club summer school at Corvallis for having been the outstanding calf club member in the community around Forest Grove.

For the first time the Washington County Fair Board will give a prize of ten dollars to the best livestock demonstration team. Placings will be made on the same basis as at the State Fair, the winners also at the State fair this fall.

Being given a chance to demonstrate several prominent dairymen are numbered among calf club leaders in the county. F. H. Jossy, Linnton, is leader of Rock Creek club; J. L. Batchelder, Hillsboro, leads the Helvetia-Jackson club; L. T. Sills, Forest Grove, is leader of the Thatcher club, and Sam Hult, Hillsboro, leads the South Tualatin Guernsey club. William Putnam, Jr., of Hillsboro, is leading the Farmington club; A. J. Evers, Forest Grove, leads the Verboort Holstein club; Harry Stowell, Buxton, leads the Buxton club while J. J. Van Kleek, Beaverton, is leader of the Kinton Jersey club. The list is completed with Walter Lindaw, Portland, route 2, leader of the Union club.

Among the clubs there are several outstanding members, indicating much effort and thought on their 4-H work. The proudest boys in the county are those completing a successful year with their stock at home and at the various shows.
