Alaskan Summer Cruise Scheduled for August 14

Their "campus" the shores of the Pacific clear up to Skagway in Alaska, under the aegis of the Arctic Circle, a faculty of 10 and a student body of over 115 will leave Seattle August 14 for the second annual Alaskan summer cruise of the University of Oregon. The trip, which will take in the most picturesque scenes of the Alaskan country, will last about two weeks on the boat, with one week of study on the campus before the trip starts.

The instructors for the tour, drawn from the University of Oregon and other institutions, have just been announced by W. G. Beattie, director of the cruise. Courses cover a wide variety of subjects including art, journalism, anthropology, botany, geography, education and English literature. In every case emphasis is placed upon the Alaskan elements in the courses.

Reversing last year's procedure, the students will take a week of work here before going on the cruise and will take their final examinations while on the boat, so that when they dock they will be ready to depart for their homes. Classes will be held on Saturday as well as other days in the week, so that work will be completed promptly, Mr. Beattie said.

Students will leave Eugene on August 13, going by train to Seattle, where they will stay over night. They will sail on the Admiral Rogers, at 10 o'clock in the morning of August 14. The campus week of study will be from August 4 to 12.

The faculty includes Frank Jenkins, editor of the Eugene Register-Journal; Dr. Charles N. Reynolds, Stanford University, anthropology; Dr. Rudolf H. Ernest, U. of O., English literature; Mr. Beattie, education; Dr. Earl Packard, geology; Prof. A. K. Sweetser, plant biology; Nowland B. Zane, art; M. H. Douglass, librarian; Kathryn Bailey, registrar; and Fred N. Miller, physician.

69TH ANNUAL STATE FAIR DATED FOR SEPTEMBER 22-28

Salem, Ore., July 31, (Special)—Preparations for Oregon's 69th annual state fair this year are declared to include every possible feature to insure the largest and most complete exposition in the history of the event.

Premiums and purses aggregating \$80,000 horse race prizes totaling an additional \$17,500 and a seven-day event instead of the usual six-days are among the many attractions of the program to guarantee the success of the state wide project to be held September 22 to 28. With the fair being held over thru Sunday, a plan but once before attempted, total attendance is expected to far eclipse any previous showing, while the additional day also will thwart unreasonable weather in hampering the exposition.

Applications for entries to the horse show have been exceptionally large, and the record purse offered this year is expected to attract the finest stables of the East and Midwest. Entries into the stake races closed July 1, while class race entries will be received until August 15.

Early applications for entrants to the livestock exhibition indicate that this branch will be larger than at any previous exposition, according to Mrs. Ella S. Wilson, secretary of the state fair board. Exceptional interest is being shown in all classes of stock showing, it is declared.

Expositions throughout the United States this year are watching the Oregon event keenly to observe the results of the first disease-free showing of cattle ever attempted. A new rule adopted by the 1930 fair board provides that all dairy cattle over one year old must be provided with health permits issued by an approved veterinarian, testifying that the animals have been duly examined and are free from infectious abortion. The certificates must be obtained within a month of the opening fair date.

Members of a herd certified to be free from the disease and to which has been issued an abortion-free herd certificate will be accepted as exceptions to the rule. Untested animals will be subject to an examination on the fair ground.

Work is progressing rapidly in preparing the grounds for the huge crowds, and every effort is being made to have everything in readiness in ample time to care for early arrivals.

E. P. Chase, Publisher of the Atlantic (Iowa) News-Telegraph, says: That talking hard times has a peculiar psychological effect. Nothing spreads like a tale of calamity. The most of suffering humanity is a good deal like the old lady who said she was "poorly, thank the Lord."

If one goes down the street of his home town, feeling as if a fiddle and looking the part, and a dozen friends tell him he looks bad and must be sick, he will be sick before the day is over. And contrariwise, if he go down the street feeling not up to himself and a dozen people remark on how well he is looking, he will be well before the day is done.

Such is the influence of psychology and nowhere is that influence felt so keenly as in business. If everyone cries calamity, we will likely have calamity. If everyone decries it, its spectre is most likely to vanish.

The men who are successful in business, as a general rule, are so engrossed in attending to their own affairs in an intelligent manner that they have little time to think about poor conditions.

Except in very rare cases where some untoward thing befalls a community, leaving impaired financial ability and decreased trade in its wake, conditions are largely what we make them.
