## Beaverton Schools to Open Doors September 8th

The Beaverton Public schools will open their doors at 9:00 a. m. September 8, 1930. At which time there will be assembled the largest number of students that have ever attended the Beaverton Schools.

Work is being rapidly completed in and about the building getting them in excellent condition for the opening day.

School busses will operate again this year, bringing in students from 19 different non-high school districts.

Transportation will be provided for grade school children living further than one-half mile from the grade school building. One additional bus being purchased this year for that purpose.

Any child in the District is eligible to enter the first grade whose sixth birthday comes on or before December 1, 1930.

All teachers have been elected and are arriving in town daily. The complete list of teachers employed by School District 48 follows:

## Representative Korell Speaks at Joint Meeting of Clubs

Representative Korell was present at a joint meeting of the Beaverton Kiwanis club and the Beaverton Chamber of Commerce Wednesday evening and spoke to a large gathering.

In his address Mr. Korell spoke of the increasing importance of the Pacific coast as an "international highway." He said that, according to the United States department of commerce, the exports from the ports of Oregon, Washington, and California, aggregated increases of \$38,000,000 during 1929 and that merchandise exports from Oregon alone were valued at \$70,208,381 during 1929—a gain of \$936,393 over the preceding year.

## Calf Club Stock Tested for Entry in Fair

4-H Calf clubs will be well represented at the County Fair this fall according to the statement of W. S. Averill, assistant County Agent in charge of the animal and crops clubs.

Doctor Coon, of Forest Grove and Dr. Nicol of Hillsboro, accompanied Mr. Averill have been taking blood samples from club calves to be shown at the Fair. Blood samples are sent to the laboratory at the Oregon State College, where tests are made for infectious abortion. This test is required by the County and State Fair boards for all cattle over 6 months old shown at these Fairs.

Doctors Coon and Nicol are making a special price to club members as their share in encouraging the exhibition of club stock at the Fairs.

Notices were sent out recently to all club members concerned asking them to have their animals up in the barn on a certain day and of the 30 notified all were ready and waiting except one. Drs. Coon & Nicol complimented Mr. Averill highly on this showing, saying that the response is much better than they expected.

Reports received on these tests will be received in about 10 days, it is expected that all calves tested this year will show a clean bill of health. Last year out of some 18 tested only one showed abortion reaction.

## Growers Ask for Inspection of 1930 Crop of Potatoes

Sixty potato growers of Washington County have made application to have their 1930 fields and crop inspected for certification, according to W. F. Cyrus, county agent. The first field inspection for these growers has been completed. The second field inspection will be made about the middle of September. Most of the plantings are looking reasonably well at this time but weather conditions for the next few weeks will determine to a large extent just what the yield will be.

Burbanks predominate but there is some increase in the acreage of Netted Gems. Earliest of All, American Wonder, British Queen and Early Ohio, are the varieties, represented in the list for which certification is sought. Growers of certified potato seed in Washington County are looking at this type of seed production as something more than just having an inspector approve his field and crop. Many of the growers of this county are taking advantage of the attention they need to give the crop to make the certified grade and are starting the development of what they expect to be improved strains through careful field selection of seed stock.

Due to a rumor that another petition is to be circulated providing for the creation of a mail route out of Aloha, eventually eliminating the Huber office which would cover an entirely new territory from that served out of the Beaverton postoffice, a mass meeting was held at the Huber hall. About fifty persons attended, all staunchly pledging their support to the Huber postoffice and agreeing to discourage any further efforts to establish a route in this district.

Frank Dietsch and Postmaster Hanna of Beaverton, were present and gave brief talks on this subject.

A protest petition was drawn up stating that the residents of Huber were in favor of retaining their local postoffice and were satisfied with the present mail routes. Persons residing at Huber are asked to sign this petition.

A committee composed of F. S. Livermore, Sr., C. J. Rose, and Mr. Gillsdorf was appointed to attend the Kiwanis meeting Wednesday at Beaverton and ask Rep. Korell who was a guest of the club, to use his influence to have the Huber postoffice and rural route left as they are now.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Aug. 21—(Special to the Enterprise)—Hute Johnson, of Beaverton, is among the nine men who are expected to try out for tackle positions on the Oregon football team this fall when Dr. C. W. Spears, coach, issues his first call for practice on September 15.

Johnson played tackle on the freshman eleven last year under Prink Callison. Competition on the yearling team was keen, because Bill Morgan, Medford star, and Carson Mathews, 218-pounder, from Eugene, were on hand. Johnson is next to the lightest of the nine men who aspire to play tackle this fall. He weighs 185.

Since Austin Colbert, two-year veteran and all-coast tackle, has been shifted to guard, one of the tackle posts will be open. George Christensen, Colbert's running mate, seems to have his same position cinched again for practice next month and try for tackle include Marion Hall, two-year letterman, Henry Heyden, Norman Jesse and Ralph Bates, one-year letterman, Carson Mathews, Bill Morgan, and Hute Johnson, freshmen, and Joe Jansa, transfer.

## C. E. Barker Represented County at Convention

## Electric Company Taxes Amounted to \$14,322.50 in County for 1930

Taxes to be paid Washington County by the Pacific Northwest Public Service Company during 1930 will amount to \$14,322.50 on the company's property in that portion of the county where it serves, according to R. R. Easter, division manager with headquarters at Hillsboro.

This information was received early this week by Easter from E. W. Moreland, company statistical engineer, who has recently reviewed the company's tax situation preparatory to making the final payment on 1929 taxes due November 5.

Total 1929 taxes and bridge rentals for the Pepee system amount to \$1,432,637.00. This is 11.3 cents of every dollar of the company's operating revenue, or gross income, which was \$12,732,766 in 1929.

A recent report from Earl L. Fisher chairman of the state tax commission, showed that utilities will pay property taxes aggregating \$7,193,363.67 during the tax year 1930.
