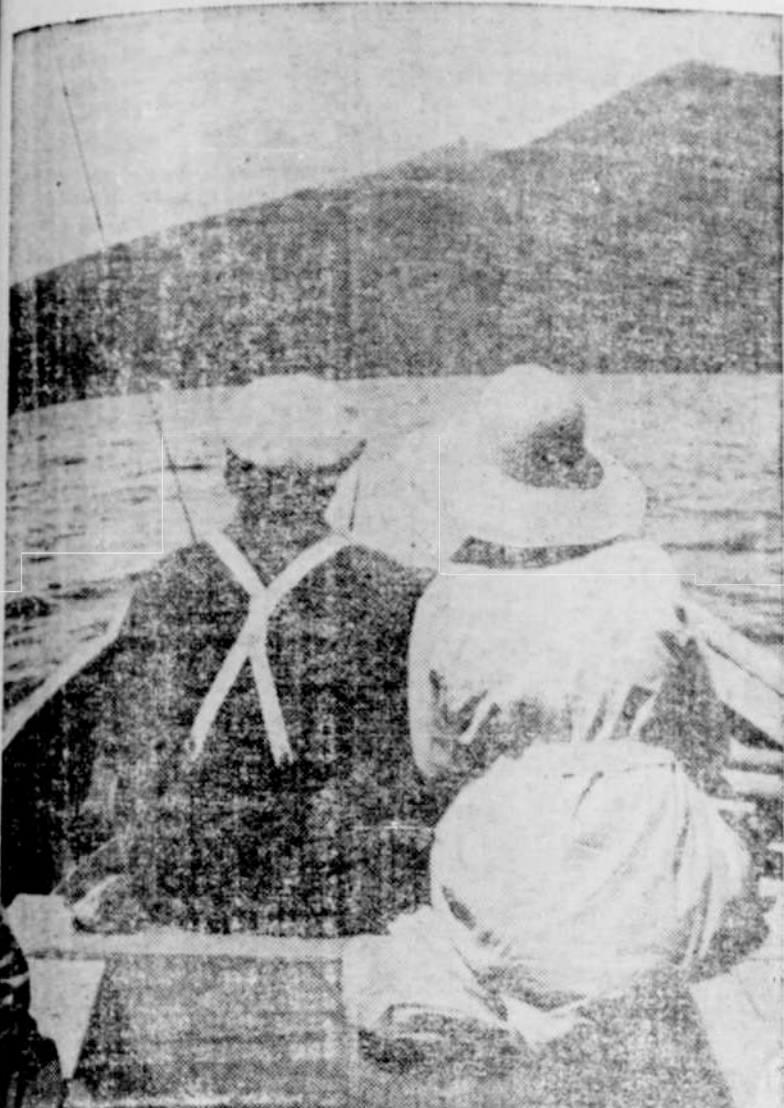


REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR TAKES GREAT PLEASURE IN GUN AND REEL

YAMHILL TAXES COM- PARATIVELY LOW

Yamhill county residents who feel that their taxes are high will be surprised to learn that as a result of a tax survey made last week of the 26 counties in Oregon Yamhill county stands at 14th place in the column of tax levy figures. Incidentally, Yamhill and Walla counties are tied.

Yamhill county has an average levy of 39 plus mills as compared with 65 plus mills in Clatsop and 62 plus mills in Josephine.

NEW WALNUT PRICE SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

The North Pacific Nut Growers' association of Dundee has announced the new price schedule which is one and one-half cents higher than last year on walnuts and five cents higher on walnut meats. The prices are:

Franquettes—Fancy, 23c; large 27c standard 19c.
Soft shell—Fancy 23c; large 25c; standard 19c.
Mayettes—Fancy 23c; large 27c; delivered in 5-pound bags.

Meats—Light amber halves, 50c; halves and pieces 45c.
Crop prospects are reported short in most districts. Sales have been heavy with an early sell out expected.

Six Jokers in the Amendment

- 1 Districts can be pieced together like a crazy quilt out of patches of territory, contiguous or otherwise, in one or more counties.
- 2 Districts can levy taxes upon the taxable property of such districts, with no limit on the amount of taxes that may be levied.
- 3 Districts can "issue, sell and assume evidences of indebtedness," with no limit on the amount or kind of debts to be "issued" or "assumed."
- 4 Districts can take over and "assume" defaulted bonds of insolvent irrigation districts and load these debts on to other property
- 5 Districts can and must make up all losses in higher taxes in higher water and electric rates, or both, without check or limitation
- 6 Five directors can exercise all these autocratic powers, with all bars against extravagance and oppressive burdens removed

Favorite Recipes of a Famous Chef

The two following recipes, Mr. Guillot points out, are sufficiently unusual to be well out of the ordinary routine of the family menu, but at the same time are both economical and easy to prepare.

Deviled Bones—Brush the drumsticks, wings or back of a cold fowl with melted butter. Mix together one tablespoon prepared mustard, one tablespoon chutney, and one tablespoon curry powder. Cover the parts of the fowl with the mixture and broil lightly. Mix together over the fire one cup gravy, one teaspoon sugar, juice of one lemon, one tablespoon ketchup, few grains cayenne, and salt and pepper. Cook the parts of the fowl with the sauce for five minutes and serve.

Spanish String Beans—Shred two medium-size onions. Saute in two tablespoons butter until tender. Mix with two cups strained, stewed tomatoes. Add salt and pepper to taste, one teaspoon sugar, and a few grains cayenne. Bring to boil and add one quart of freshly cooked string beans. Simmer for a quarter of an hour, add two teaspoons butter, and serve.
