

Automobiles Take Toll of 100,000 Child Lives

Shocking Estimate Based Upon Accident Statistics, Says Secretary Wilbur

Washington, D. C.—If history repeats itself, approximately 100,000 children will be killed or maimed by automobiles within the next twelve months in the United States.

This shocking estimate, according to Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, Secretary of the Interior and chairman of the White House Conference on Child Health and Protection, is based upon the accident statistics of past years.

"When I was a boy," said Secretary Wilbur, "the only thing we feared out in the open country, was a rattlesnake. But the rattlesnake is a domestic pet compared with the automobile. Rattlesnakes kill a few thousand persons a year in this country, but automobiles kill 100,000 children alone, because our safety precautions are not as

modern as our mode of travel. "Worst of all, the automobile is only one of the many new modern dangers to which our children are exposed."

Members of the White House Conference on Child Health and Protection which will meet in Washington November 19-22 at the call of President Hoover, have been working for the past year upon the problems of childhood.

"All they have discovered—that is, every bit of scientific knowledge relative to children now in existence in the field of medicine, public health, education and training—will later be at the service of what the President has rightly called the 'deeply concerned parents' of this country."

More than 1,100 experts from every field will gather at the Red Cross and D. A. R. buildings in Washington for the Conference. Secretary Wilbur, as chairman, will make the closing address. The Secretary has served both the American Medical Association and Stanford University as president.

GASOLINE SALES OF SEPT. THIS YEAR EXCEEDS THOSE OF SAME MONTH LAST YEAR

Gasoline sales during September advanced over the same month of the previous year, following the August slump which was believed caused by heavier purchases of motor vehicle fuels during the gasoline war of the first part of the summer. In September, the total gallonage was 16,430,903, which was 735,850 gallons in excess of sales of the previous September.

Revenue from the sale of gasoline and distillate derived as a state tax amounted to \$69,410.79 in September bringing the total for the first nine months of the year to \$5,196,892.95. This amount is an increase of \$1,552,847.66 over the same period in 1929. In spite of the belief that business conditions had affected all lines, gasoline sales fell under last year only in the months of January and August, the entire nine months having brought an increase of 8,447,504 gallons of gasoline dispensed. This additional gallonage combined with the increase of the tax to four cents has brought the substantially greater receipts.

New Children's Crusade Led by 1,000 Scientists

At Call of President Hoover, Women Pioneers Rally to Cause of Childhood

Washington, D. C.—More than 700 years ago a children's crusade brought death to nearly 90,000 children.

The new children's crusade, led by the President of the United States and 1,100 scientific idealists, will bring more abundant life to hundreds of thousands of children when the plans for the White House Conference on Child Health and Protection come to fruition.

Making surveys of child problems under the direction of the President and his aides, Secretary of the Interior Ray Lyman Wilbur, chairman of the Conference, and Dr. H. E. Barnard, director, are many pioneers in work for children. A number are women.

One, Miss Julia Lathrop was the first chief of the United States Children's Bureau after its formation. She is a member of the

Planning Committee of the Conference to be held November 19-22 here, and also of the Education and Training section.

A memorandum prepared by Grace Abbott, another pioneer, for the League of Nations in 1923 led to an investigation of the traffic in women and children in the western world. Since 1921 she has been head of the Children's Bureau.

She is a member of the Conference Planning Committee and of the section on Public Health Service and Administration.

Miss Martha Van Rensselaer's name appears upon all the lists of America's greatest women. She is Director of the New York State College of Home Economics at Cornell, and a pioneer in work for farm women and children. She is associate director of the Training and Education section.

Lillian D. Wald, founder of the Henry Street Settlement in New York City, and originator of the district nursing idea, is working with the Conference section on Education and Training.
