Acreage given to field Peas Increased 10 Times over Last Year

Almost 1000 acres of Australian winter field peas are being planted by Washington County farmers, according to W. F. Cyrus, county agent. Last year the acreage of this crop in this county did not exceed 100 acres. A. H. Evers, A. J. Evers, Emil Cron, Forest Grove and G. W. Henderson, Gaston, all grew these peas last year and obtained yields of clean pea seed varying from 1300 to 1800 pounds per acre. Most of the crop being planted now is being grown under contract. As a seed crop Australian field peas offer considerable possibility. The crop is used in the southwest for cover cropping and that region is dependant upon other places for

their seed. With prices as they are at the present time this crop gives promise of greater return per acre than wheat. Most of the acreage that is being planted to field peas this fall is being taken from what would probably usually be seeded to wheat.

From reports some of the farmers in one or two of our coast counties have found the crop very desirable as a hay crop. One great advantage under those conditions is that it will usually outyield any other legume hay they can grow. Last spring in Washington County the peas made a somewhat larger earlier spring growth than did the vetch. If it will do this consistently orchardists will find a use for it in orchards where they are growing cover crops. One or two dairymen of the county have sown Australian peas with the intention of trying the crop for silage

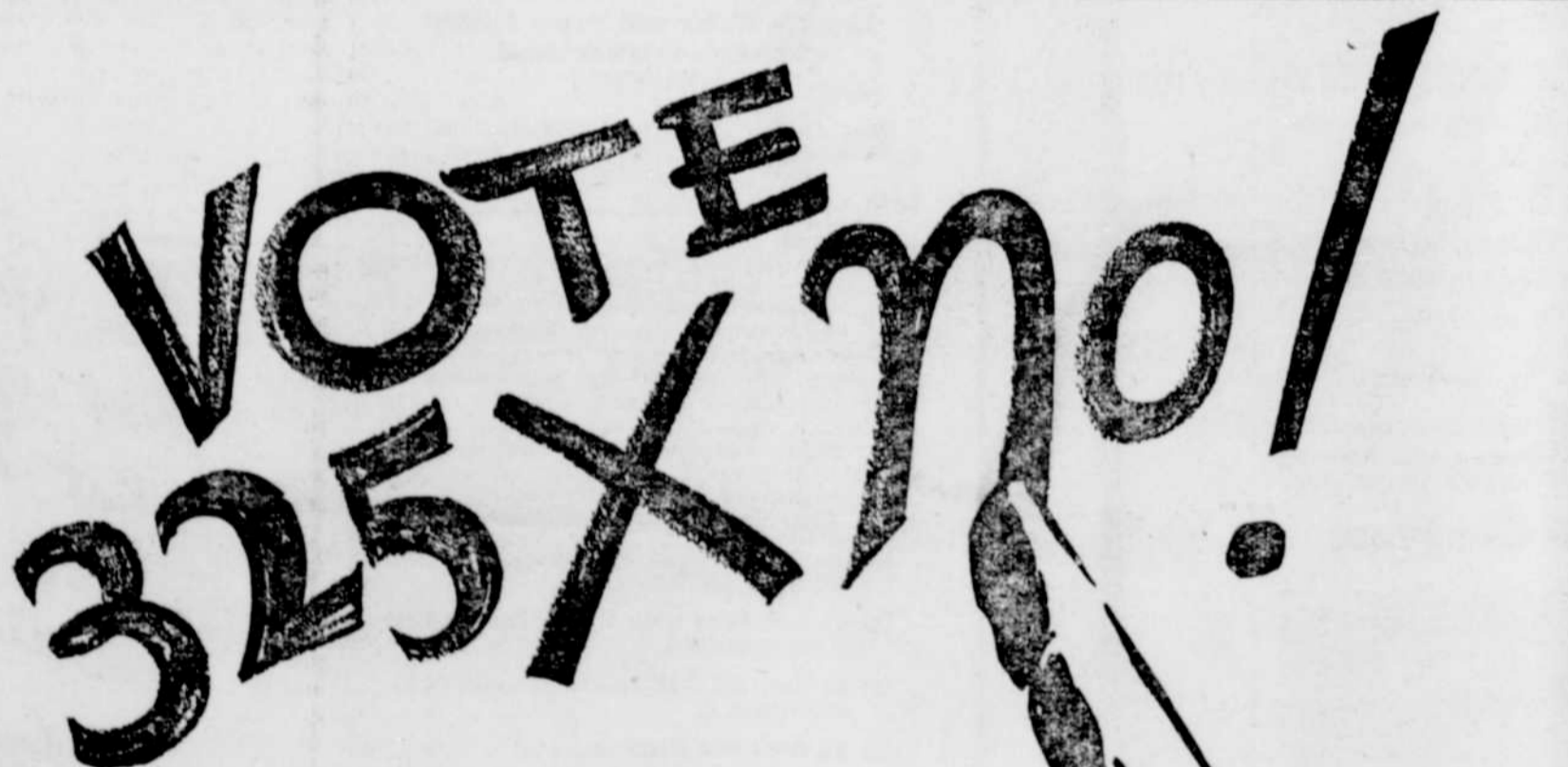
