Church of the Nazarine

The Church of the Nazarene is
located at the corner of First and
Stout streets. This work began in
Beaverton nearly five years ago fol-
lowing a revival campaign conducted
by Rev. Homer Williams, then of
Portland. Rev. Williams continued
with the work as pastor till the an-
nual assembly of the church after
which Miss Ava S. Adams took
charge of the work. Under her
earnest and faithful labors the church
prospered and was built up but
owing to ill health she was obliged
to discontinue after one year. Rev.
Roy L. Nolt was then called by the
society and remained with the work
for three years.

Following the annual assembly of
1930 Rev. Nolt accepted a call to the
church at Olympia Wash. and Rev.
W. B. Tait, the present pastor, ac-
cepted a call to the church, coming
to Beaverton from the East Side
Nazarene Church in Portland.

In matters of doctrine this church
adheres to the teachings of John
Wesley and the early Methodist theo-
logians, but in its general policy fol-
lows a more Congregational order.
The pastors are called by the local
church and local affairs are taken
care of in democratic fashion.

Bethel Congregational Church

The Bethel Congregational Church
of Beaverton was organized Jan. 4,
1880, in the district school house, by
Rev. Geo. H. Atkinson, D. D., with
three charter members: Mrs. C. S.
Hamilton, Miss Annie J. Hamilton,
and Mrs. E. M. Klink.

August 2, 1881 the Bethel Congre-
gation met to make arrangements
for securing a chapel and it was de-
cided to purchase the Grange hall.
This was accomplished and January
1, 1882 the Church house was dedi-
cated: Rev. G. H. Atkinson and Rev.
E. Rogers officiating. On this day
Rev. E. Rogers was called as pastor
for one year and services were held
on the first and third Sundays of
the month. This first home of Beth-
el Congregational church still stands
today on the corner of First and
Stout Streets and was occupied by
them until the completion in 1925
of their new Church building located
at Sixth and Watson Streets.

The ceremony of breaking ground
for the new church was held June
28, 1925. The actual breaking of the
ground was done by Mrs. Mary
Stitt the oldest member of the
church and a pioneer of the town.
Mrs. Stitt still resides in our Com-
munity and is active in the affairs
of the church so far as her many
years will permit.

December 13, 1925 the new Bethel
Congregational church was dedicated
with services and ceremonies befit-
ting the auspicious occasion, which is
outstanding in the life of Bethel
church. Rev. Geo. N. Taylor was
pastor of the church at that time.
The Rev. J. J. Staub, Portland,
preached the dedication sermon. Dr.
C. H. Harrison, Supt. of Oregon
State Congregational Conference, Rev.
W. C. Kahner, D. D. of Salem, and
Rev. J. E. Dobbs, D. D. president
of Pacific University of Forest Grove
were out of town speakers on the
program for the day.

These new and modern buildings er-
ected at a cost of approximately
\$17,000.00 and adequately caring for
the Church and its many depart-
ments, is a monument to the faith
of its members and their desire to
fulfill their mission in this Commu-
nity.

The church parsonage, Fifth and
Main streets was built in 1916, dur-
ing the pastorate of Rev. Mr. Un-
shaw, on a lot donated by F. W.
Cady.

Bethel Church is now enjoying its
Fiftieth Anniversary of preaching the
gospel of Jesus Christ and salvation
thru Him to mankind and exerting
a spiritual influence in the life of
this community with which it has
grown these past fifty years.

The Rev. T. Arthur Dungan is ac-
tively pastoring the Church at the pre-
sent time. Other recent ministers,
from 1912 on were: Rev. W. L.
Upshaw, Rev. Horace S. Wiley,
Rev. E. S. Bollinger, Rev. C. A.
Blanchette, Rev. George N. Taylor,
Rev. D. M. McNeil.

Methodist Episcopal Church

The Beaverton Methodist Church
was formally organized in 1880. The
original church building was erected
in 1884. This society was the out-
growth of a work begun by Jason
Lee who preached in a camp meeting
held on the Tualatin Plains in 1843.
On July 12th this sturdy pioneer
used the text: "For where two or
three are gathered together in my
name, am I in the midst of them."
Matt. 18:20. The present church
building was remodeled and rededi-
cated in 1911.

Rev. J. J. Patton, who was ap-
pointed to this church the latter
part of June 1930, is not a stranger
to this part of Oregon. His birth-
place is in the southern part of
Washington county about ten miles
Southwest of Forest Grove in the
valley named from his grandfather,
William Patton. Rev. Patton re-
ceived his university training in Pa-
cific University at Forest Grove and
Willamette University, in Salem,
Oregon. Except for five years of
ministry in Fairbanks and Seward,
Alaska, Mr. Patton has spent his
entire life in Oregon. The beautiful
churches at Seaside, St. Johns,
Portland, Oak Grove, Dayton and
Dundee are in part the outcome of
his labors. For five years preced-
ing the Beaverton appointment he
was pastor at Dundee where he lo-
cated the packing plant and grad-
ing plant of the North Pacific Nut
Growers Association. Although the
present pastor has been in Beaverton
but little over two months those
attending this church say that "It is
evident a new day of hopefulness
and expectation has come to us."
Rev. Patton has under his care
also the commodious suburban com-
munity church at Garden Home.

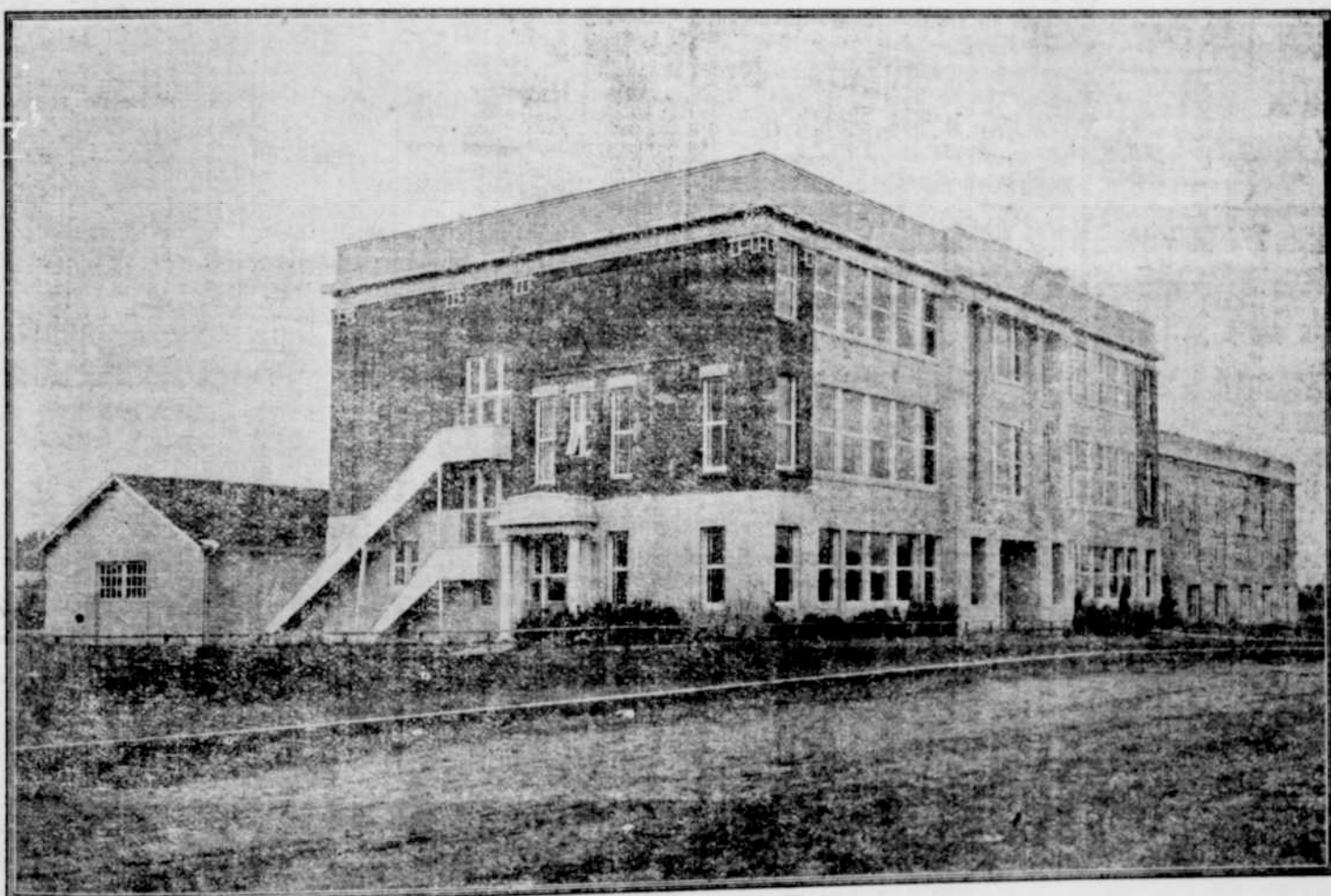

Beaverton Has Splendid Educational System

In turning back the pages of local
educational development of Beaverton
it is interesting to note that even
prior to the year 1888 the town
boasted of a modern educational sys-
tem. The destiny of the local district
during and immediately following 1888
was under the direction of W. V.
Hall, William Tucker, A. M. Pike
and A. E. Klink as members of the
board of directors.

At that time 115 children of school
age were residing in Beaverton, and
what was then District 48, a much
smaller district than the present one.

The old school house was located
in the north-eastern part of the
town and at that time was valued at
\$100,000. The furniture and equipment
were valued at \$1500. During that period
of local history it was possible to se-
cure the best teaching talent at an
average monthly salary of \$73.00 per
month.

The next step in the educational
progress of the local schools oc-
curred June 20, 1910, when it was
decided by the tax payers to aban-

don the old school house which had
outlived its usefulness and to ac-
quire new grounds upon which to
construct a modern eight room build-
ing. The present site of the grade
school was purchased and construc-
tion started upon the first unit of
the new building which was com-
pleted during that year at a cost of
\$8500.00. The members of the board
of education at that time were F. W.
Cady, A. W. Pike, and Mr. Benja-
min with C. E. Hedge as clerk. V.
M. Vose, acting principal of the local
schools convened school for the first
time in the building on January 3,
1911.

In 1914, the population of Beav-
erton reached the point where it was
deemed advisable to enlarge the
educational program include a stand-
ard four year High School. W. B.
Emmons, H. E. Weed, S. H. Davis
and C. E. Hedge, as members of the
board were authorized by the peo-
ple of Beaverton to bond the Dis-
trict for \$23500.00 to build a modern
brick structure for high school pur-
poses. This program was carried
out and the building completed late
in 1915. By the construction of this
new High School building Beaverton
could boast a building that was sec-

ond to none in Washington County
comparing favorably with the High
School buildings at Forest Grove and
Hillsboro.

The growth of the schools is the
barometer to the growth of the com-
munity. The following figures copied
from the school records on file in
the Superintendent's office tell an
interesting story of the growth of the
Beaverton schools: 1920 210, 1921 254,
1922 307, 1923 328, 1924 354, 1925 449,
1926 423, 1927 500, 1928 485, 1929 559,
1930 574.

The increase in 1924-25 was due
to the fact that the local Catholic
grade school did not operate that
year.

The decrease in 1928 was due to
the building of the new Tigard
Union High School at Tigard.

School District 48 is on a sound
financial condition. Vernonia, which, like Tillamook,
embraces a lot of standing timber in
its district, shows a high tax cost
child, nearly \$100. Gresham and
Oswego, which maintain
schools of a quasi-suburban char-
acter, also run high—very much
higher than Milwaukie, whose school
situation is similar but whose tax
per census child is less than 2-3

those of Gresham and Oswego.

Beaverton, close to Portland, man-
ages to conduct its thriving school
system at a tax per census child of
less than 60% of Gresham and Os-
wego.

At the present time the Beaverton
schools rank second to Hillsboro only
as to buildings and second to none
as to adequate equipment and educa-
tional opportunities. The local high
school is the only high school in
Washington County accredited by the
Northwest Association of Secondary
and Higher Schools.

The members of the School Board
responsible for the favorable showing
of the past ten years are Dr. C. E.
Mason, L. R. Dean, F. M. Cady and
Doy Gray. The School Clerks dur-
ing the same period are J. B. Kam-
berger and F. W. Livermore, Jr.
Much credit should be given these
men for the sound financial condi-
tion of the schools and the policies
outlined by them for their future
development. These, and all other
directors have served the School
board loyally and faithfully without
any thought other than giving the
children of Beaverton educational
advantages equal to those in other
localities.

church and school, was started and
completed under the active pastorate
of Father J. P. O'Flynn, now pas-
tor of Parkrose. These buildings
like their predecessors will at no
distant date be remodeled or re-
placed to meet the ever growing
needs of a steadily increasing catholic
population here. The sisters of St.
Mary of Oregon, teach St. Cecilia
parochial school, which has enrolled
about sixty pupils, in grammar grades.
St. Cecilia church and school mini-
ster to a hundred families, within its
parish limits, and it is not unlikely
that this number will be doubled

of Beaverton known as Cedar Mill.
It was called Church of St. Anthony,
and was in use up to fifteen years
ago.

The growth of the county, and
coming of the railroads caused a
shift in the location of homes and
farms, and the gradual location of
new and better roads, was largely
responsible for the building of the
present church within the city limits,
just north of the State Highway, be-
tween East and Main streets, Beav-
erton.

Twenty years ago, the present
combination building containing

within a decade. Among the many
pastors who labored here may be

St. Cecilia Catholic Church

The Catholic church held its ser-
vices in the immediate vicinity of the
present city of Beaverton some 60
years ago. Fathers Verboort and
Bernann, in these pioneer days tra-
versed the north and breadth of
Washington county both on foot
and horseback, ministering to the
scattered flock. In 1880 under the
pastorate of Father Hermann, a new
church was built, a few miles north
