

Forest Grove Jeweler Claims Robbers Secured \$3000

Although a careful check has been made by Sheriff Connell no trace of the two robbers alleged to have held up Arthur Shearer, Forest Grove Jeweler, and made away with \$3000 in cash and goods, has been found.

Arthur Shearer, manager of the Shearer & Son jewelry firm, reported to the sheriff that about 9:30 last Friday morning two men in a coupe drove up in front of the store, one man entered the store, pointed a revolver at him and said "I'll take these" scooping up set and unset diamonds, 15 watches and \$1500 in cash.

Officers could find no witnesses or anyone that noticed a car in front of the store. A car which answered the description given by Shearer was stopped at Banks, but the driver was easily identified.

The firm had been conducting a sale and young Shearer said the proceeds of the previous day had not been banked. The firm reported that it had been robbed of about \$500 worth of merchandise about a month ago. No clues to this robbery were secured by the sheriff's office.

Creditors of the firm attached the remaining goods of the store the first of the week and the sheriff's office now has the custody of the remaining assets which is not a large amount.
