Yamhill County Budget Increased

Taxpayers of Yamhill county will have an increase of \$245,344 to meet in the 1931 budget as reported by the county budget board. The total taxation of the county is now \$541,179.61. High school tuition, which cares for students in outlying districts was boosted from \$65,000 in last year's budget to \$105,000. Numerous other county items were slashed, which reduced the total increase.

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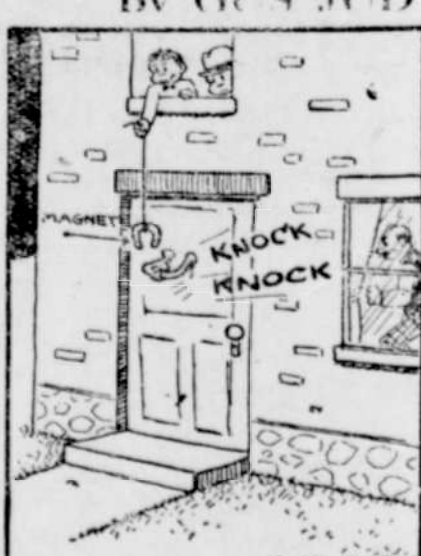
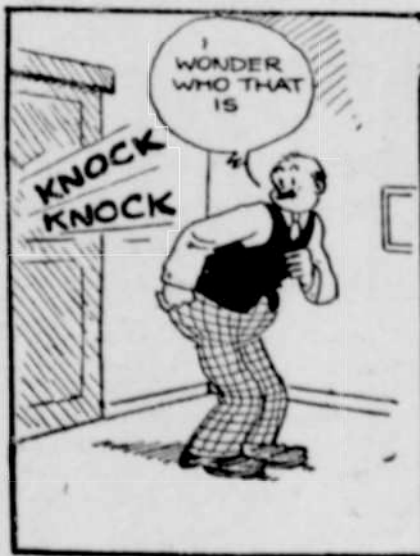
