Former Beaverton Students Make Splendid Showing

Persons interested in the Beaverton public schools will be glad to hear of the excellent showing made by former students in the placement examination in English, required of all students entering institutions of higher learning.

From the incomplete reports received thus far the Beaverton group ranks in the upper half of the Freshman class and complete reports will probably find them well above the dividing line. In the fall examination the highest score possible was 191. At Oregon State the highest score was 179. Any person making a score of 113 or above ranked in the upper half of this year's freshman class. The average for our pupils entering this school was 133 with no person falling more than three points below 118.

Such a rating is one of which the patrons may well be proud, and school officials are hoping that the complete reports when received, will show even a higher placement on the list of Oregon high schools than is now anticipated.

Beaverton Grade School
