## Marathon Preacher Housed in Petch House During Church Loyalty Campaign

The Rev. and Mrs. A. Lee Aldrich, who are conducting meetings in the Beaverton Methodist church opened the "Church Loyalty Campaign" here last Tuesday evening. They were highly pleased to find that everything was in readiness to receive them into the "Gateway City of the Tualatin Valley." Through the entertainment committee the Petch house had been equipped for entertaining them. The meetings are to continue every evening for two weeks except on Monday. Sunday services will be both morning and evening. At the first service the speaker declared that very odd and contradictory things are being done in these days and sometimes by the same people. "One state recently passed a law making it unlawful to read the Bible in its public schools, yet the same legislature passed another act to place a Bible in every cell in its penitentiary. 'Why not,' said the speaker, 'give the young plastic lives God's word and save this vast group of national waste and make them an asset for God and humanity instead of a liability.' Whether children or adults the audiences sat thrilled by the able show of intellect and oratory of this renowned, versatile preacher. Mr. Aldrich was very emphatic that he believed the Bible from cover to cover. He said that he not only believes that there is 'A heaven but also a hell to be populated by those who spend their lives on this earth.' With a Bible in his hand he declared that 'If there is no hell then God Almighty made an awful blunder in sending His Son Jesus Christ to this earth to suffer death on the cross that we might be saved.' Many who heard Mr. Aldrich in his first addresses here have stated that this is undoubtedly Beaverton's opportunity to receive the uplift of one of the most able men who ever visited this community.

## Dairy Co-op will Succeed only by 100% Backing says W. W. Henry, Mgr.

Washington County's unit of the Dairy Co-operative Association heard W. W. Henry newly elected manager at a meeting in the Union High School auditorium in Hillsboro.

Mr. Henry believes it is hard to live up to a reputation that has gone before you. The only promise that he will make concerning the Co-op is that if the dairymen will back him up and the co-op 100 per cent it will be an absolute success. If you do not have all the distributors behind you they can drive an unfair bargain.

D. C. Howard, field man for the

Association said that dairying at this time, has the best outlook. Also that the Co-operative will not agree to get all the members wanted but he will guarantee to get all they deserve and can possibly get.

The first speaker was R. W. Morse of O. S. C.; his topic was "Summer Milk Production." He divided the subject of dairying into two groups. 1st group action; second individual management.

J. H. Tuill, O. S. C. extension course on marketing, compared the safe and sane methods used in business today with the methods used 10 years ago. The association has three problems to work out. 1. Promote co-operative creameries. 2. Marketing whole milk of C and S grades. 3. Marketing B grade milk which has made a slow but steady growth. Stated that there are now 159 co-operative milk organizations.

R. A. Ward, Manager of Pacific Co-operative Wool Growers said that the principals of bargaining does not vary no matter what the commodity is. In 11 years the organization has 4900 members. Two factors in successful business is economical and sound business management. Co-operative marketing is the farmers greatest hope.

W. J. Carter, Sec-Treas. spoke on the condition of the organization and the contracts. There are 452 contracts paid in full or \$4,520; there are 254 or \$699 paid in part. There is \$2160 due on contracts on which no payments have been made. On January 1, there were 922 contracts filed in the office. Now there are 960 contracts and Mr. Carter expected it to pass the 1900 mark. There are 311 contracts signed in Washington County.

Arthur Ireland of Forest Grove, R 2 was elected director to serve for 1 year.

The annual Dairy Co-operative meeting will be held in Portland February 3, 1931.
