P. Ripley, who was taken into custody by the state, federal and county prohibition officers Wednesday afternoon of last week, charged with having a 65 gallon capacity still and 200 gallons of mash, was fined \$3000 and 1 year in jail on indictment number one and No. two was postponed.

The jury in the damage suit of Minnie Schaffer administrator of the estate of George Schaffer against H. F. Alexander, returned a verdict in favor of the defendant. The plaintiff sought damages in the sum of \$10,000 as administrator of the estate of George Schaffer who was accidentally killed January 11th, 1903, on the Olson road near Beaverton when a sled on which he was riding behind a car swerved into the path of a car driven by Alexander.

The \$50,000 damage suit of Leonard Lepsch against John Freudenthal involving an automobile accident at Cornelius, July 19, 1929, in which Brynnon Mills at Forest Grove was fatally injured and Lepsch suffered a badly crushed heel, was heard before Court Judge Bagley this week. Lepsch in his complaint says he was confined to his bed for 5 months and that he will be a cripple for life. Hare, McAlar & Peters are attorneys for the plaintiff and E. B. Tongue for the defendant.

Jurors in the case include: Oscar S. Dallman, Philo R. Dickinson, Louis J. Hamel, Benjamin Lea, Robert M. Banks David Hagg, Frank L. Hewitt, Albert A. Lamont, John H. Busch, B. W. Armstrong and H. W. Scott and James Lewis.

Late Wednesday afternoon the jury returned a verdict for a judgment for \$13,500 against the defendant.

HI-LIGHTS OF 1931 SESSION OF OREGON LEGISLATURE

Salem Ore., Feb. 10 (Special)—H. A. Kuratli, Justice of the Peace at Hillsboro and former county clerk of Washington county was before the legislature Wednesday greeting friends.

H. B. No. 259 is of special importance to all parties selling drug products by automobile as it will compel them to take out licenses of pharmacists in order to sell Raleigh and Watkins Products to the farmers. Messrs J. L. Benson and E. H. Burnham of Beaverton, also Charles Rose of Huber, appeared before the Washington County delegation Tuesday against this bill.

"Tillamook on the Rind" is fast becoming famous as the greatest cheese product on the coast. Literature of this great industry of Tillamook through the courtesy of Carl Haberlach is being distributed from Senator Fisher's desk in Oregon Senate.

Senators Burke and Fisher are strong in their opposition to H. B. No. 34 "Free Text Book Bill" which will levy an additional burden of over two million dollars on the taxpayers of Oregon. Do we want to bankrupt the state? At this opportunity we are asking the County Courts and Pomona Grange organizations of Lincoln, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill to pass some strong resolutions against H. B. No. 34 immediately and forward them to members of the legislature.

At an important session of Joint Highway committees of House and Senate also Automobile and Roads committee of the House with the State Highway Commission Monday night, Representative Winslow and Senator Fisher, both of Tillamook, were informed that it would require about thirty days more for the Highway Commission to decide in regard to also adopting Wilson river Route for heavy freight line into Tillamook city via Washington county points—Forest Grove, Hillsboro and Beaverton. Winslow and Fisher are much interested in the decision.

Widening the Highway between Hillsboro and Beaverton is paramount at this writing in Washington county's road program. The Tualatin Tunnel S. B. No. 195 by Woodard and Fisher eliminates some objections against the first Tunnel Bill S. B. No. 19 which was withdrawn. With the "Short Cut to the Sea" an assured fact lends great impetus to the proposed tunnel to accommodate the tremendous amount of auto traffic between Portland, Beaverton, Hillsboro, Forest Grove and Tillamook.

Mrs. P. J. Barton of Tillamook was visiting the legislature Monday. She enjoyed the sessions immensely.

H. A. Hosteler, of DeLake, Lincoln county was in Salem Thursday in regard to pending legislation in behalf of best interests of Washington county.

Senator Fisher has new official stationery advertising Lincoln, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill as "Land of Opportunity" which is meeting with favorable comment.

H. B. No. 76 permitting Lincoln county to vote upon the discontinuance of the County unit school system passed the House Feb. 3, and the Senate Feb. 10. Mr. Nash sponsored this bill in the House. Senator Fisher spoke for the bill in the Senate where the vote was unanimous.

Jack W. Connell, sheriff of Washington county called on Senators Schulermerich and Fisher also Representatives Peter, Jannsen and Thornburg Thursday in regard to important legislation on law enforcement, and State Police legislation now pending.

Friday on motion by Senator Moser and seconded by Senator Fisher, the congratulations and best wishes of the Senate were extended to Mr. H. T. Bruce, in honor of his 75th birthday. Mr. Bruce has served the Senate as doorkeeper for five sessions and Sergeant-at-arms one season. A tribute well deserved for faithful service. Mr. Bruce is a resident of Reedville, Washington County.

Ben Riesland and H. H. Jeffries were at Salem this week calling on the Governor.

Farming Department of Agriculture in Oregon Meet no Opposition

Representative Macpherson opened the hearing called to consider the Department of Agriculture provided in Senate Bill 87. This outline of the bill was followed by representatives of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, who endorsed it. They reported that among 200 persons interviewed no opposition was found.

Oregon is the only state in the union without a Department of Agriculture and is retrograding agriculturally when compared with neighboring states were statements of these proponents of the bill.

President Kerr of the O. S. C. stated that a committee from the College had studied the proposition and that its attitude is favorable to the creation of the department; that the work of the department and that of the college should be cooperative that there should be the greatest economy and efficiency resulting.

President Kerr would call head of the department "Commissioner." He suggested amendments for section 10 line 16 and for section 11, dealing with fundamental relations of department and college. These changes suggested were accepted by the committee.

If there were any opponents to the creation of this department of Agriculture present they very successfully "hid their light under a bushel basket." Farmers were conspicuous by their absence.

The bill is sponsored primarily by the State Chamber of Commerce and by the Portland Chamber of Commerce. It is opposed by the Oregon Cooperative Council.

Ditch Digging Demonstration Scheduled for Next Tuesday

Digging a ditch with dynamite will be demonstrated on the P. M. Jorgenson farm three miles northeast of Hillsboro at 1:30 P. M. Tuesday, February 17. Charles McAdams, of a nationally known powder company, will show how the charges should be placed and fired, says W. F. Cyrus county agent. Where the right kind of powder is used and properly placed a clean ditch is left, according to McAdams. Powder offers a satisfactory means of clearing old ditches or opening new ones where the use of machinery or implements is not practical.
