Adapting the "dollar day" enterprise of the mercantile world to rail transportation, the Southern Pacific today announced plans for the greatest travel bargains ever offered in the West.

Scheduled for two successive Fridays—Feb. 20 and 27—the special sale of roundtrip transportation at the rate of approximately "100 miles for \$1" has been authorized over all the company's widespread Pacific system. It was revealed here by Mr. Allen local agent for the railroad.

The "dollar day" tickets will be accepted on all trains, both coach and pullman, Mr. Allen announced, and will be good for five days, the return limit being Tuesday midnight following the day of sale.
