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OREGON OUTLOOK
REPORT ISSUED

With the improvement in business conditions which seems fairly certain during the 1931-32 marketing year, the demand for farm products is also expected to increase says L. R. Breithaupt, economist of the Oregon Extension service who has just released the Oregon Outlook Report. It is in two sections, the first dealing principally with livestock enterprises and the second the crops and horticulture outlook.

The Oregon report, based on information gathered from every county of the state, in addition to the conclusions of the national outlook conference is available in mimeographed form from county agents or direct from the state college. Copies of comments on the report by college specialists in the various divisions will be distributed from the same sources.

Although improvement in poultry prices may not reasonably be expected before late in 1931 or early 1932, successful commercial poultrymen of this state will do better to increase rather than decrease their flocks believes A. G. Lunn head of the poultry department. Feed, building and labor costs are low, he explains and volume of production is necessary to return a profit in competition with other favored sections.

The comment by P. M. Brandt, head of the dairy department, was to the effect that "in general dairy expansion in Oregon should be recommended only where production costs are favorable." He points out that an accurate, careful check on production costs by individual dairymen is now of more importance than ever. Many Oregon dairymen, he says have already reduced production costs to the point where satisfactory profits are obtained even under present conditions, while others could not make dairying profitable if prices were doubled.

Outlook for turkeys, beef cattle, hogs, sheep and wool mohair and a number of other commodities are also reported in the first section of the report, while the second deals with wheat and other farm crops.

PAY FOR STATE WARDS SOUGHT

A bill, authored by Representative Angell, will, if it becomes law, require parents to pay \$25.00 a month for each of their children who are inmates of the State Industrial

School for girls and of the State Training School for boys.

If the parents or their estates cannot meet this requirement in full the court may designate the amount they are able to pay.

This is a measure designed to hold parents economically responsible for the care of their children and to relieve the general public from a portion of its present tax burden.

An unusual feature of these excursion tickets will be the honoring of stop over privileges in either direction within the final limit of the ticket according to Wooster.

COURSES LENGTHENED

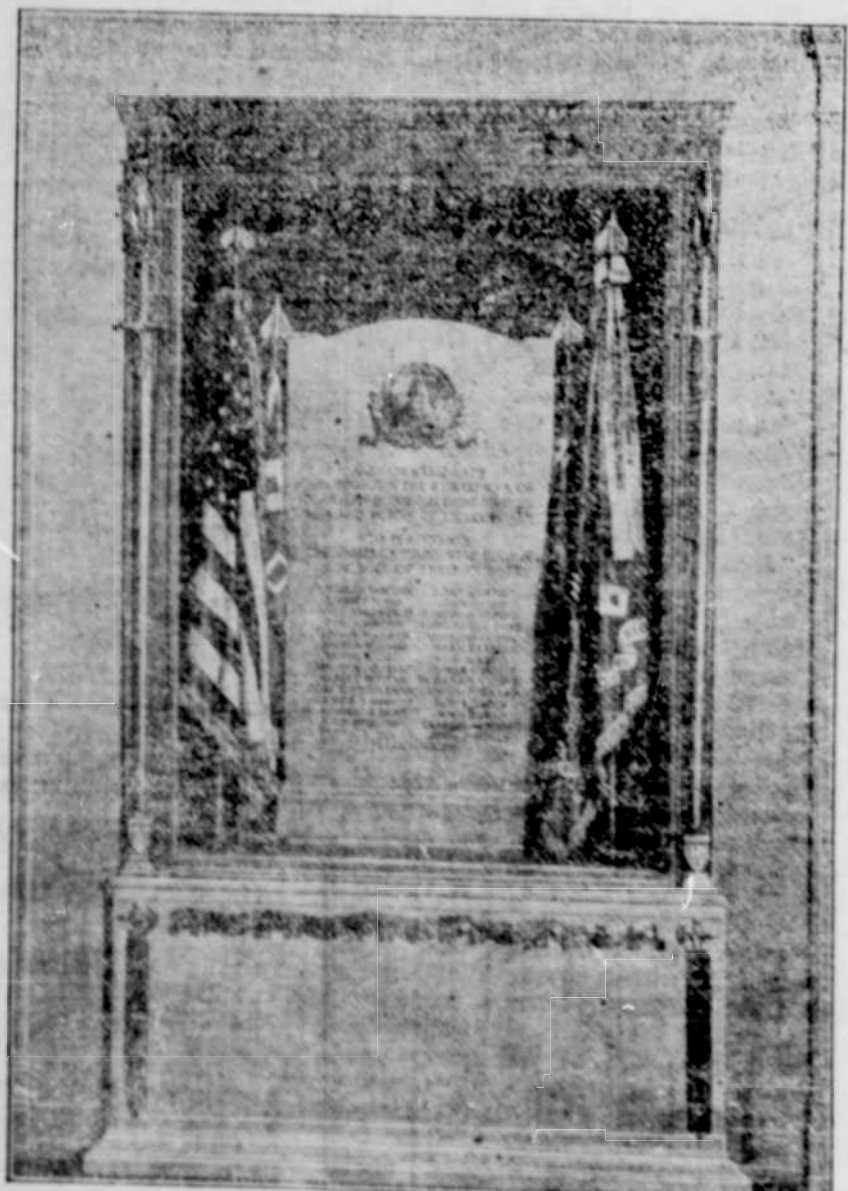

The effect of this measure will be to require four years or more attendance at a normal school for certification. It may prove a temporary measure to reduce the surplus of teachers.

A TESTED RECIPE

YORKSHIRE PUDDING

Put two cupfuls of flour into a bowl and mix one teaspoonful of salt. Beat up 3 eggs and stir them into the flour. Add 2 cupfuls milk stir until smooth, then turn into a pan containing a little drippings from your roast beef. Have the batter no more than an inch deep in the pan. Bake 30 or 40 minutes, cut in squares and place around the beef when ready to serve.

OREGON CALLED "HALF BOLE-SIEVIST" IN BIOGRAPHY

Charles McNary, U. S. Senator from Oregon, is the target this week for the caustic political pen of Collier's "Gentleman at the Keyhole," whose comments on the leaders in Washington politics are frequently seasoned with vitriol. But for Senator McNary he has nothing but praise, picturing the Oregon politician as "almost the only link between the Eastern and Western factions of the Republican party."

According to the Gentleman at the Keyhole: "McNary comes from a half-Bolshevik state. The initiative and referendum started, I think, out there. And in the last election Oregon went pink. So McNary's political future probably lies with the Progressives rather than with the Old Guard."

"His sympathies, those who know him best are and have always been with the under dog. But he is not the kind of man whose convictions make him rigid and intolerant. He is a good friend of everybody, social in his instincts. He is not an orator. His talents all lie in immediate dealing with men. He loves the politics of the Senate and has a rare gift for them."

"If an open break came between the Progressives and the Regulars, his position would be awkward for then he would have to make his choice between the two factions. He works to prevent that breach. He has selfish interest, aside from the keen pleasure he takes in playing the game successfully, in postponing, even in preventing the inevitable."

"I take it that a special session forced by the Progressives will be a sign that the Progressives have decided to go their own way and have a party of their own in 1932. There is not much sense in a special session except as a means of propaganda for the policies and issues of the Progressives. It would be a means of harassing Mr. Hoover steadily. It would be a defiance by the Progressives of the business sentiment of the East, which demands no special session. It would be a widening of the breach between East and West in the Republican party."

"McNary refuses to believe that there will be a special session. Every compromise he can make will be aimed to avoid a special session. As one of the conferees between the Senate and the House on Muscle Shoals he used all his art, and that is considerable, to induce the House to yield to the Norris plan for government operation of this power plant. And he succeeded in passing from Congress to President Hoover responsibility for deciding whether the power issue should split the Republican party."

The true human qualities with which she endows the character and the dramatic heights she attains in the climatic scenes will make "Millie" a character everyone will remember.

Brilliant Supporting Cast
Lilyan Tashman as the gold-digging "Helen" contributes several comedy scenes with Joan Blondell as the dumb girl friend "Angie." The numerous "wrong men" who crossed "Millie's" path are James Hall as "Maitland," Robert Ames as "Tommy" and John Halliday as "Damier." Halliday has a semi-villainous role he handles with a deftness which makes the part outstanding. Lovely Anita Louise as the daughter "Connie" Frank McHugh as the bibulous reporter, and Edmund Breese contribute some fine moments, both dramatic and comical.

Potato Sausages

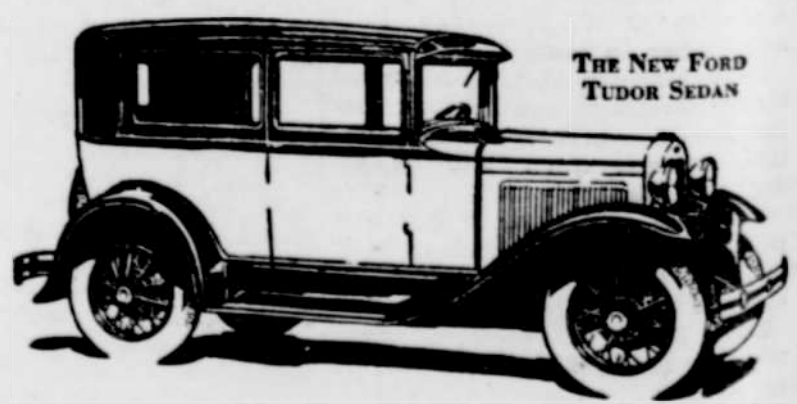
