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GOOD JUDGMENT NECESSARY IN DRIVING

"Motorists should realize and appreciate that today extraordinary skill must be exercised to prevent accidents due to the steadily increasing volume of motor vehicle traffic.

This was the plea voiced by Earl Hensley, Supervisor of Safety, Pacific Greyhound Lines, in a recent radio address on behalf of a safety campaign sponsored by the California State Chamber of Commerce.

Hensley, in speaking of the cause of accidents, said that research work among more than 700 drivers of Pacific Greyhound Lines has indicated that physical fitness and rigid physical examinations did much to eliminate traffic accidents.

He urged every automobile driver to consult a physician and ascertain physical ailments which might be the cause of endangering their own welfare as well as the lives of other persons, and then take measures to correct the ailments.

"For the private motorist to drive his automobile without an accident he must study and cultivate the ability to exercise good judgment at all times; to decide quickly and act instantly whenever called upon to do so," Hensley said.

He cited four fundamentals of safety, observance of which would give the safety movement the full support of the individual motorist. They are: A belief in safety, an acceptance of the principle of personal responsibility, an active rather than a passive attitude toward safety and a close study of State motor vehicle laws and safe driving practices.

SPRING FASHION HINTS GIVEN BY STYLIST

Although lady's silhouette will be much the same in 1936 as in 1935, a few important changes are noted in the new spring styles.

The normal waistline is still the popular one, but this year a belt is necessary where shirring was used last year. The full skirt also retains its popularity, but the fullness is placed lower, sometimes well below the knee, and is in the form of pleats rather than flares.

Skirts are about the same length, or perhaps half an inch longer. About nine inches from the floor seems to be preferred for afternoon or informal evening wear, and 10 or 12 inches for ordinary daytime use. Sport clothes may be whatever length is most suitable to the wearer, altho the middle-calf length is recommended. Skirts are rather tightly fitted over the hips, giving a molded effect.

Necklines are a little higher, but soft lines prevail here as last year, and the cowl effect is still good. Sleeves are important with many types being shown. These include the flared sleeve, the capelet sleeve the dolman, the puffed or the three-quarter sleeve. The latter are used in coats with the long sleeve of the dress showing beneath to match the part showing below the hem of the coat.

Pastel shades are favored again, but are a little grayer or more neutralized than last year, and considerable combination of contrasting colors is noted. For instance, dress and hat are usually matching in tone, with a contrasting color for the coat, and in some cases sleeveless dresses are used with jackets of contrasting color.

AMERICAN'S EARN MUCH

The following comes from Washington, D. C.: The high tide of 1928 in financial affairs brought the golden harvest of incomes above a million dollars to 511 Americans.

The internal revenue bureau showed this in compilations made recently. At the same time the treasury sent to congress the account of another rich reaping by taxpayers—refunds last year aggregating \$126,836,333.

The 1928 receivers of millionaire incomes included 74 women, 29 of them single. Twenty-six persons received more than \$5,000,000. Those were spread over the map from coast to coast but eleven lived in New York.

HOG WORM PROBLEM GROWING! STRICT SANITATION URGED

Sanitation as a means of prevention is the best method of controlling the worm problem which is causing so much loss to hog raisers in many parts of Oregon. H. A. Lindgren, livestock specialist of Oregon State college, told a group of 60 farmers who met on the campus last week for the annual pig feeder's day.

Using clean farrowing pens, having the sow thoroughly washed before farrowing and putting her and her litter on clean pasture are some of the most important helps toward preventing an infestation of intestinal round worms Lindgren said. Very little can be done in the way of cure once the pigs are infested, he explained, and if the pigs do not die, at least their development will be retarded six to eight weeks.

Detailed methods of sanitation in the hog lot, and directions for administering worm repellants where necessary may be obtained from county agents or direct from the college Lindgren said.
