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GREED

IN GUISE OF BUSINESS

If it's good business to humiliate one of your department heads publicly before his subordinates by flourishing gossip of talebearers, discharged employees and disgruntled vendors Governor Meier treated Oregon to an exhibition of it in his sacrifice of Supt. Meyers as one of the obstacles to his passion for absolute power over every individual in the service of the state. Each employee, from asylum cook down to the humble ranks of college professor, must know to whom he should feel beholden for his daily bread and must crouch his knee to the tyro who would be tyrant.

And, if that was good business, it must have been an excellent stroke of enterprise to embody convict insubordination by publicly proclaiming, as quoted with approval by his Portland organ: "I have been in contact with guards and others during the adjournment of this hearing, and they have voluntarily called to my attention the unrest at the penitentiary under the present management and said it is of such a nature to be dangerous."

We presume it also was good business to blame Supt. Meyers for the control board having cut red tape by borrowing and repaying a \$100,000 loan on state flax under the business necessity of keeping the state's flax business operating instead of suspending the business in mid-season.

Supt. Meyers himself an experienced and successful merchant, has given the penitentiary four years of business management without hysteria and without disorder, under frightfully difficult physical conditions due to overcrowding of unfit structures. His uprightness, reliability and competence were the reasons for his selection for the job, and they have been vindicated abundantly by his record in it. Yet Governor Meier, greedy in state affairs as he always has been in his private business wantonly impaired the usefulness of a worthy superintendent whose sense of responsibility now prompts him to resign in the hope of averting dire consequences of convict unrest fanned by the governor's precipitant business methods.

Greedy. Greedy. The chief characteristic of Julius L. Meier. Greedy for business regardless of the fate of ethical competitors who scorned to employ his ruthless methods. Now it's greed for power.

No matter what good may eventually come from Julius L. Meier's resourcefulness in destroying others so he may possess to build up himself, his underlying motive cannot be covered even by the great iron dome of the statehouse.

Disguising greed as good business may fool avid bargain hunters, but will not forever fool the decent citizens of Oregon—Oregon Voter.

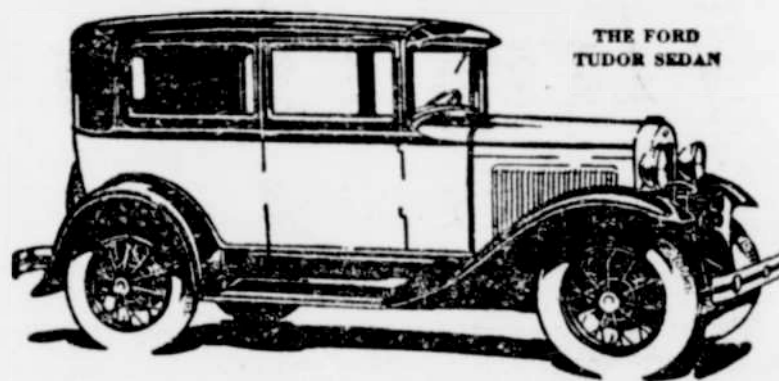

JANTZEN BEACH SCHEDULED TO OPEN SATURDAY, MAY 2

The gala opening of Oregon's million dollar amusement park, Jantzen Beach, north of Portland on the Pacific Highway, has been scheduled for May 2nd and a host of special entertainment features, including a thousand dollar fire-works spectacle, will signalize the beginning of the 1931 season. In the evening approximately six thousand persons are expected to take part in the annual Portland's policemen's ball.

In addition to the many entertainment features previously installed at Jantzen Beach Park, many rides and thrillers have been purchased for the 1931 season including the "Leaping Lena" and a One Lakes Training Airplane that provides all the thrills of actual flying and a fourteen hundred foot vertical drop.
