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E. M. NEWMAN FATALLY WOUNDED, YOUTH COMMITS SUICIDE

E. M. Newman, 61, was shot to death in the basement of his home at Aloha Tuesday evening, by Pete Dimeo, 17 year old son of his neighbor and close friend, Frank Dimeo. After the murder the youth fled from the house and committed suicide by shooting himself through the head. The tragedy of the two families was caused by the desire of the boy to have money for pleasure.

Recently the elder Dimeo and Mr. Newman had rented a plot of ground near Oswego to raise potatoes. Pete was given the job of running the tractor. As a compensation for his services Mr. Newman had frequently given the boy money. His father had complained that the money was only wasted and asked Mr. Newman not to give him any more. During the day Pete called several times at the dead man's home, the last call about 7 o'clock found Mr. Newman in the basement chopping wood. Pete descended the stairs to the lower floor, Einar Albertson, a foster son of Newman's following close behind, as he sensed things were not right, but did not think such a tragedy would take place.

According to reports Dimeo demanded money and when refused drew the gun firing at the elderly man. The foster son attempted to intervene, without success.

Mr. Newman was a prominent Washington county farmer and contractor. He recently took a road paying contract near Pendleton and had returned from the eastern Oregon city last Sunday for a short visit. He had planned to return there the day of the tragedy.

He was born in Sweden and came to the United States 28 years ago, first making his home with his family at Warren, Or. They lived there 14 years, and about nine years ago moved to Aloha. His home there was one of the best in the town and was situated not far from the Pacific highway to the south.

Pete Dimeo born in Portland November 8, 1913, was a resident of Aloha for 16 years. He was one of 11 children. Frank Dimeo the father, has a reputation of being a hard working man.

The bodies are at Pegg's Undertaking Parlor, awaiting final arrangements.

Articles of Incorporation Filed for Farmers Co-op

Articles of incorporation for the Farmers' Cooperative of Yamhill county were filed this week, setting out that the organization would buy and sell farm goods, gasoline and lubricants with headquarters in McMinnville. One thousand shares, valued at \$10 each, were listed with the provision that no one member shall hold more than 10 per cent.

Members are confined to Oregon and are limited to membership in the Farmers' Educational and Cooperative Union, the articles said. Signers of the articles were William B. Duerst, W. W. Russell, G. H. Fullenwider, Clyde W. Smith and E. M. LeFevre.

ST. HELENS, A carload of lime, consisting of 30 tons, has recently been distributed through the county agent's office to farmers in the Scappoose and Warren districts. The lime will be used largely in correcting acidity on land to be planted to alfalfa and other legumes.

duce employment in this country. The New York Times says that 26 countries have raised tariff rates against the United States since our present tariff law was passed.

Now, let us look at what the administration says about the subject. In the first place, Sec. Stimson calls the Canadian action an entirely domestic concern of Canada, which we have no right to protest. Obviously, he is correct. Dr. Julius Klein, assistant secretary of commerce and advisor of the president, points out that the Canadian rates affect less than four per cent of the total of our exports to that country.

Dr. Klein says that Canada is merely utilizing for her own protection the same methods that have been used in this country, and that her new rates are intended to "develop a more evenly balanced economy." He also suggests that the Canadians are putting themselves in a more favorable position for the forthcoming conference among the British dominions on the subject of reciprocal tariffs. Generally, the Republicans assert that the action of Canada in following the example of our tariff laws have helped the United States.

Earlier Dr. Klein had assailed the critics of protection in a speech in New York, where he denied that the tariff hampered our trade or penalized Europe. In 19 leading countries, he asserted, our share in their import totals last year was about the same as in 1924-27.

However, at the same meeting the ambassador from Argentina delivered a courteous warning that his country might be compelled to embark on a high tariff policy because of inequitable treatment at the hands of the United States. In such a case, he added, the United States would lose a market for manufacturer but gain the gratitude of his country "for having taught us to make use of high tariffs."
