

ON OREGON FARMS

DALLAS—Last year Ernest Holsington, of Lewisville, in cooperation with J. R. Beck, county agent, applied ground limerock to a portion of his alfalfa field, and left an equal area unlimed. At the first cutting of alfalfa this spring, Mr. Holsington cut just 4½ times as much alfalfa from the limed as from the unlimed plot, and the second cutting, which is now nearly ready for harvest, shows an even greater difference.

THE DALLAS—County Agent W. Wray Lawrence reports that the recent heavy rains have caused considerable germination of wild morning glory seeds on plots treated with chemical weed killer last fall, and advises that these plots be cultivated before the roots get established again.

HILLSBORO—By using home grown feeds supplemented with some purchased materials, Elmer Burber of Hillsboro, has decreased the cost of calf meal more than 30 per cent, he recently reported to W. F. Cyrus, county agent. Mr. Burber is using the calf meal ration developed by the dairy department at O. S. C. He says that in addition to the savings, the heifers fed this meal in 1930 were the finest bunch he has ever raised.

ST. HELENS—Danish Bortfield turnips, a variety introduced by the Astoria Experiment station and which has become popular with coast dairymen, have proved successful in Columbia county during the past year, County Agent Nelson reports. This year 150 pounds of this seed was ordered for Columbia county, more than twice as much as last year. The supply has been exhausted, but inquiries are still coming in.
