U. of O. Has Youngest Law School Dean

Wayne L. Morse, professor of law at the University of Oregon for the past two years, has been appointed by the board of higher education as dean of the law school, succeeding Dean Charles L. Carpenter, who will leave at the end of the term to accept a professorship of law at the University of Southern California. Dean Morse is the youngest dean of a university law school in the country.

University of Oregon, Eugene — Wayne L. Morse, professor of law for the past two years at the University of Oregon, has been appointed dean, following the resignation of Dean Charles L. Carpenter, who goes to the University of Southern California, it is announced here by Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president.

Dean Morse will be the youngest dean of any university law school in the country, as he is but 30 years old, although both his teaching and research have already made him nationally known. Dean Carpenter came to the University in 1922 from Topeka, Kansas, where he served as dean of the law school of Washburn college. In 1927 he became dean here, and under his direction, the law school has made steady and consistent progress. He is regarded as an authority on

many phases of law, and he has published widely. His resignation from the faculty here is regarded as a distinct loss, not only to the school but to the legal profession of Oregon as well.

After extensive experience at the University of Minnesota, Dean Morse came here in 1929, highly recommended by many outstanding educators. He graduated from the University of Wisconsin, was awarded the degree of bachelor of laws from the University of Minnesota in 1928, and has completed his work for the degree of doctor of jurisprudence from Columbia. He has lately finished outstanding research in the field of crime, and as director of the Oregon Crime Survey and through his work on the survey of the grand jury he has achieved national attention.

American Legion Junior Baseball League to Play for Championships

State finals of the American Legion junior baseball league sectional championships will be held on the Oregon State college diamond August 6, 7, and 8, at 2:30 in connection with the state American Legion convention.

A three game series sponsored by state legion posts under the direction of Roy S. Keene, director of athletics at Willamette university, and state director of junior baseball for the American Legion will be played on Thursday, Friday and also Saturday if necessary to play off a tie. All other events of the afternoon will be dropped in favor of the games.

The state is divided into eight districts which are subdivided into eastern and western sections composed of four districts each. Winner of the inter-district game will compete in the semi-finals for the sectional championship. Eastern and western section champs will then decide the state championship. The winner of this series will represent Oregon at Butte, National championship honors will be decided at Houston, Texas. Considerable interest has been displayed by both legion and non-legion men throughout the state in the coming series.

Ralph O. Coleman, varsity baseball coach and head of the department of intra-mural athletics at Oregon State college, who has charge of field activities, will be umpire in the state finals. Coleman reports the diamond to be in perfect shape for the event.

Finely Ground Grains Prove Best for Hogs

Fine grinding has been found to improve the feeding value of oats and barley for hogs materially, in a study reported in Station Circular 104 entitled "Preparation of Oats and Barley for Pigs."

In the investigations barley and oats were fed whole dry, whole soaked, steam rolled, finely ground and coarsely ground. Oats were fed to growing pigs under 100 pounds at the start and about 180 at the finish. Good feed grades of barley and oats were used.

Grinding improved the feeding quality of barley even more than of oats, says A. W. Oliver, assistant animal husbandman, who conducted the experiments. Steam rolling of barley increased its feeding value 16.3 per cent, or 3.4 per cent more than fine grinding, but is too expensive a process for general farm use. Steam rolling of oats lessened their value.

Little or no advantage was gained from soaking whole oats for growing pigs, or from soaking barley for fattening pigs. Coarse grinding of both grains improved their feeding value slightly but not enough to make it an economical practice. Grain was considered finely ground when the particles were so small that it was difficult to distinguish the hulls from the kernels.

Most hammer mills of the type commonly used on farms will grind grain finely when a screen with 1-3 inch holes is used. Burr mills are less suitable for fine grinding.

MODES AND MANNERS

QUESTION: I am giving a dinner party next week and want to know when the finger bowls should be placed on the table, and where. Also, is it correct to wet one's mouth as well as the fingers in using a finger bowl? G. G. C.

ANSWER: A finger bowl, with a small dolly beneath it, is placed on each dessert plate before it is brought into the dining room. When the time comes for the dessert to be served, the maid places a plate with dolly and finger bowl on it before each person at the table. Each person removes for himself the bowl and dolly, placing them in front of his plate, to the right or left. The dessert is then served, and, at the conclusion of the meal one dips one's fingers in the water in the bowl and if one wishes, slightly moistens the mouth with the tips of the fingers and then wipes both mouth and fingers with the napkin.

QUESTION: I have heard that it is bad manners to shake hands with a person when you have your gloves on and that you should remove the glove on the right hand before doing so. Is this right? E. R.

ANSWER: It is absurd to make a point of taking off one's glove before shaking hands with some one you meet. If the glove happens to be on, leave it on. Usually, when one enters a house, one has removed one's gloves by the time one shakes hands with the hostess or anyone else present, but if not—if the hostess, for instance, has met you at the door—it is natural and perfectly all right to shake hands with her before removing your gloves.

ON OREGON FARMS

ONTARIO—White Russian wheat in a trial planting in comparison with Federation on the farm of Nell Dimick of Nyssa appears much more uniform in height and is taller on the average, reports County Agent R. G. Larson. White Russian is a new wheat brought to Malheur county from Yakima valley where it is reported to have out-yielded Federation.

DALLAS—More than 500 acres of Ohio hardy red clover have been inspected for certification in Polk county by J. R. Beck, county agent, E. R. Jackman and G. R. Hyslop of the Oregon Extension service and more fields will be inspected in the near future. This strain of clover is being established to take the place of the common red clover which has met with disfavor in the east.

LAKEVIEW — Irrigation ditches were surveyed, planned and laid out by Victor W. Johnson, county agent, last month on the farms of John Ernst and W. H. Ostrom, Fort Rock. Mr. Ernst is adding another 12 acres to his pump irrigation project and Mr. Ostrom, who has just put in a deep well for pump irrigation, is laying out 40 acres of sage brush land to be put into alfalfa.

BEND—Fifty three dead woodchucks were picked up by Rasmus Peterson on his ranch in Pleasant Valley two days after County Agent W. T. McDonald had held a poisoning demonstration there. During the demonstration McDonald showed 10 farmers the proper methods of preparing and placing poisoned alfalfa tips for woodchucks.

HOOD RIVER—Failure to spray for codling moth this year has resulted in about 5 per cent wormy apples in one Hood River orchard, according to A. L. Marble, county agent. The grower now plans to thin off and destroy all wormy apples and apply a spray for the second brood.

Home Loyalty Means Success for Oregon's Specialty Crops

When you buy tomatoes do you ask for just tomatoes or "Island Brand Oregon Grown" tomatoes? There's a big difference.

Loyalty to home products is necessary to the success of Oregon industries. One of the shining examples of this fact is tomato growing and marketing in this state.

Within the Grand Island area there was raised last year about 75 acres of tomatoes which yielded about 600 tons or 24,000 bushels of excellent quality. Practically the same acreage is planted there again this year with prospects for about the same yield.

Soil, climate and industrial conditions are quite ideal on the Island for this crop. There are two canneries there.

Last year there was paid out by the cooperative cannery owners engaged in the tomato industry of Grand Island about \$5,000 for labor, \$9,200 for cans, \$2,000 for transportation. Sixty persons were employed at the cannery and many others including school pupils were employed in the fields.

Last year's demand for this home product was lacking and general prices low. The pool price has not yet been closed, but must apparently suffer from the general price deflation.

Whether this year's crop will result in a profit or a loss to the growers will depend upon the support given to growers and canners in the Oregon markets. Sixteen million cases of this vegetable are consumed in the United States annually. Portland handles approximately 85,000 cases during this time. Oregon's total pack is less than 60,000 cases. It is very apparent therefore that if Oregon consumers and dealers are loyal to Oregon products there will be a ready market at fair prices for Grand Island and other Oregon tomatoes. Without this home market this industry and many others though especially adapted to Oregon soil, climate and industry must perish.

Demonstrations of the use of Chlorates on thistles are being conducted on the McCormick farm and W. S. Averill Assistant County Agent will explain the work being done. The demonstration will bring out several interesting facts and answer many questions asked about thistle treatment including rates of application as well as the use of Chlorates dry and as a spray.

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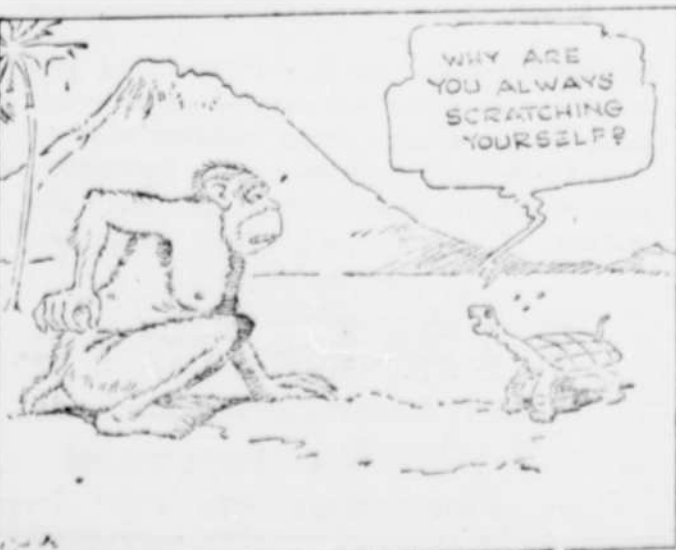
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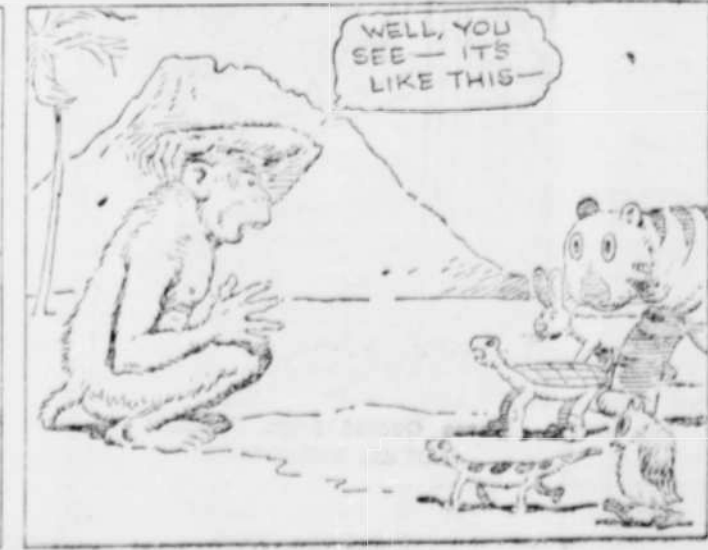
