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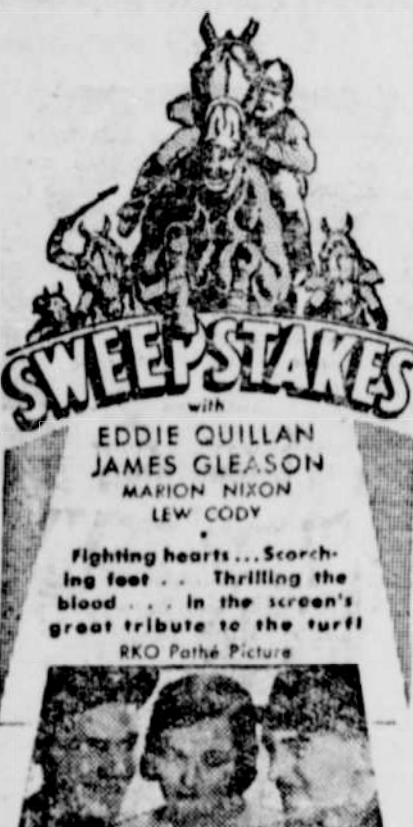

New York Scholarships Won by 3 U. O. Men

University of Oregon, Eugene — Three University of Oregon students have been honored with appointments to service fellowships to the school of retailing of the New York University according to word received here from Norris A. Vrisko, dean of the New York institution. They are: Harold Fraundorf and Harry Tonkon, of Portland, and Anton Peterson, Astoria. In addition to the one-year fellowship Peterson was awarded the David Olson scholarship carrying with it a cash stipend of \$320.

These men are among the few selected upon application from colleges and universities throughout the nation. The fellowships allow the holders the privileges of attending the New York school for part of the day and also of gaining practical experience by working the rest of the day in one of New York's largest department stores.

FAMOUS HOOD AREA WILL BE EXPLORED

Eastern Foundation Gives University of Oregon Professor Fund for Research Work.

University of Oregon, Eugene — Facts about the famous Mt. Hood area in north central Oregon, a region which each year is attracting people in increasing numbers both winter and summer, will be hunted out and made public during the next few months by Dr. Edwin T. Hodge, professor of geology at the University of Oregon. This will be made possible by a grant of \$700 to Dr. Hodge from the National Research Council, and the entire sum is to be spent on the study.

Mt. Hood, its snow capped peak dominating the region for many miles, is regarded as one of the most interesting geological mountains in the west. Dr. Hodge's study is expected to reveal many signs of minerals, of valuable soils not now developed, and to possibly open up new recreational areas. At present people flock by the thousands to the slopes of this mountain in winter, and its toboggan and ski slides are nationally famous.

In summer the many scenic and recreational spots enchant not only native Oregonians but thousands who come from all parts of the country. Fishing and hunting are to be found in wide variety, and the sheer scenic attractions are enough to lure the ordinary individual. For the casual visitor there is an excellent loop road which leaves and comes back to the famous Columbia River highway, taking the motorist right up to the region of winter sports and through some of the grandest scenery in the world.

Dr. Hodge has already achieved national distinction for his studies of geological regions in Oregon. He is the author of a volume on "Mt. Muir nomah" in which he develops the theory that a huge mountain was once present in Oregon, and that when this was destroyed by a tremendous volcanic action, Crater Lake was formed and the volcanic deposits found in wide areas over Central Oregon were left as a result.

Last year Dr. Hodge devoted to study of the Cascades, under a grant of \$500 from the research council, and his studies of Mt. Hood this year will be a continuation of this. The funds will be used for travel, for assistants and for publication of his findings.

U. O. Has Enrollment of 3,609 Last Year

University of Oregon, Eugene — Total campus and medical school enrollment for the University of Oregon totals 3609 for the year 1930-31, it was announced by Earl M. Pallott, registrar. Campus registration has reached the total of 3359, and the medical school in Portland enrolled another 250 students.

These figures do not include approximately 2000 correspondence students, nor the many others who take work in the extension centers at Portland, Eugene and other places. A total enrollment of more than 8000 students is shown by figures for the year for all phases of University work.

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
