Bargain Days for Foods

NOW is the time to buy canned foods. Both in the chain stores, the voluntary chains and the independent grocery stores bargains are being offered such as will not be found again in a long time. With the passing of the present depression, prices are expected to react to their former levels. And better times are approaching day by day.

The great difference between canned foods and practically any other products is that they never deteriorate, but will keep indefinitely. It would not occur to anyone to buy a dozen suits of clothes at once, no matter how cheaply they were sold, as they would not keep and most of them would become food for moths. Canned foods, however, are just as good next year, or the year after, or ten years from now, as the day that they were sealed in the can. The only limit to their value as an investment is the limit of your storage space. You can be sure that they will keep and that they will be consumed. There is no guess work about either of these factors.

Stock Staple Foods Now

It is the staple foods especially upon which you should stock up at the present bargain prices. Some of these are beans, corn, peas and tomatoes among the vegetables; apples, peaches, pears and pineapple among the fruits; cod fish, salmon, sardines and tuna among the fish, and whatever specialties, meats and soups your fancy dictates.

Sarah Anne's Cooking Class

One of the best vegetables of the summer is corn. Its season is brief, so we wish to serve it often and in many different ways. Most of us enjoy eating corn plain, that is steaming hot on the cob, with butter, salt and pepper. There are many ways of introducing fresh corn into the summer meals. These same dishes may be served the year around as one can buy canned corn of excellent flavor.

Squaw Corn
Cook six slices of bacon until delicately browned. Remove the bacon from the pan and pour off half the fat. Beat two eggs until light, add one teaspoon salt, 2 cups of corn, 1-8 teaspoon pepper and one can of pimento chopped. Turn into bacon fat and stir constantly over a slow heat until the mixture thickens.

Steved Corn
Cut the corn from the cob after

it has been husked and silked. Place in saucepan. Add milk nearly to cover the corn, together with salt and pepper to taste. Simmer about ten minutes or until it thickens, stirring frequently. Then add butter, one tablespoon for every cupful of corn. Serve plain or arrange in a shallow serving dish which has been lined with buttered toast strips. Curly crisp slices of breakfast strip may be arranged on top.

Corn Pie
To two cups of corn use two beaten eggs, two-thirds cup of milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon black pepper and two tablespoons of butter. Mix all ingredients. Pour into baking dish and bake in hot oven for thirty or forty minutes.

Corn Fritters
To two cups of corn add salt, pepper, tablespoon melted butter, one egg and four tablespoons flour. Drop by spoonful in hot grease.

OREGON DAIRY HERDS INCREASING IN SIZE

In spite of the low prices received for milk and butterfat, Oregon dairymen are increasing rather than decreasing the size of their dairy herds.

This fact is brought out in the figures just compiled for the second year of the Oregon dairy cost study carried on by the farm management department at Oregon State college, under the direction of H. E. Selby. On April 1, 1930, 514 dairy farms included in the study showed an average of 17 cows, while on April 1, 1931, the average had increased to 18 cows each.

The average value of the 8081 cows included in the survey was given as \$112.60 on April 1, 1929. By April 1, 1930, this had decreased to \$104 and by 1931 the figure had fallen to \$86.

For the purpose of the survey the farm management department picked at random dairy farms with six or more cows in 22 counties representing the various dairying districts of the state. When completed it is expected to show the cost of producing butterfat in the various parts of the state under varying conditions and type of management.
