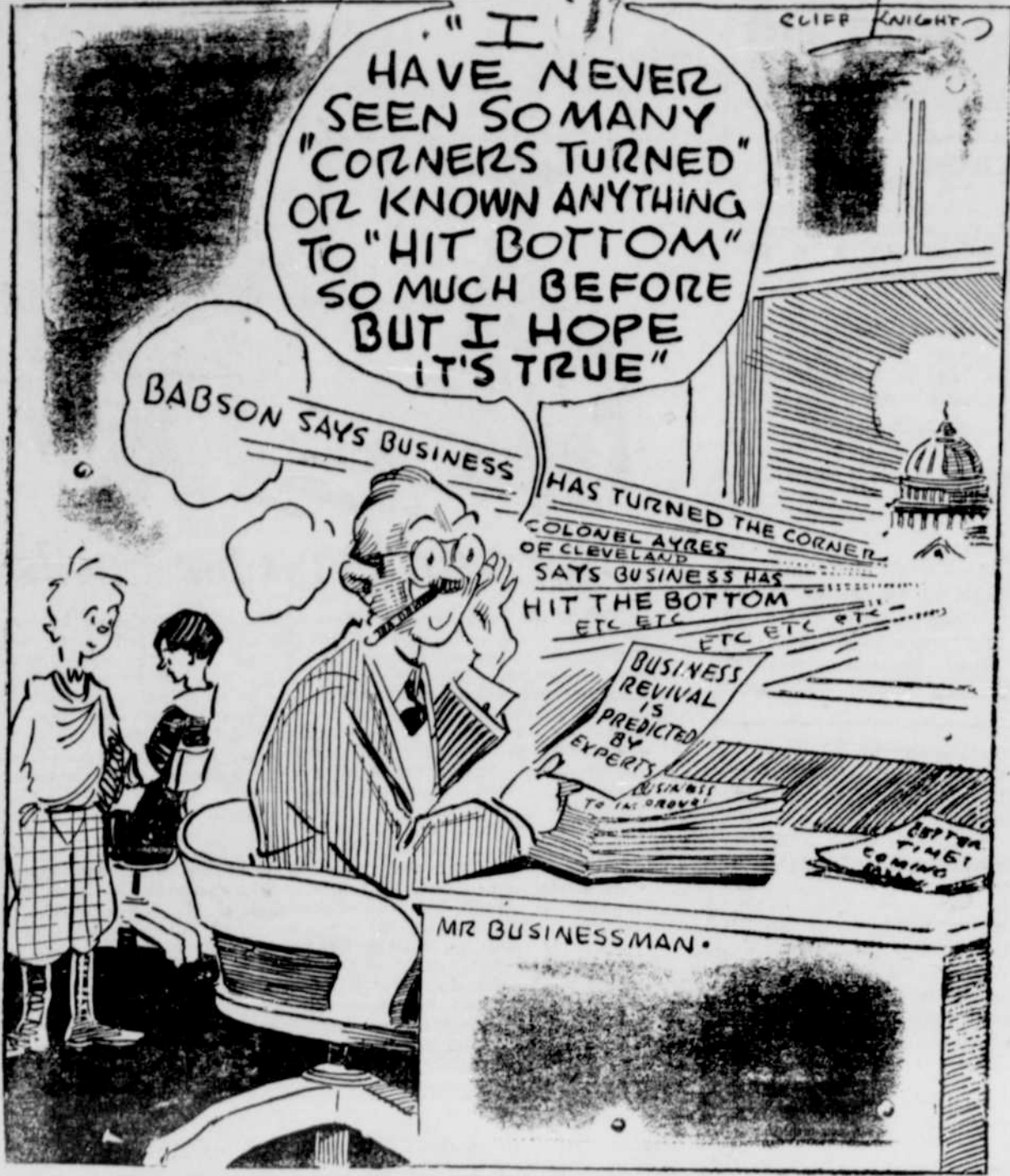


Sounds Good, Anyway!— By Cliff Knight

Mr. and Mrs. Earl Vaughn of Medford are visiting Mrs. Vaughns sister Mrs. Roy Berat for several days.

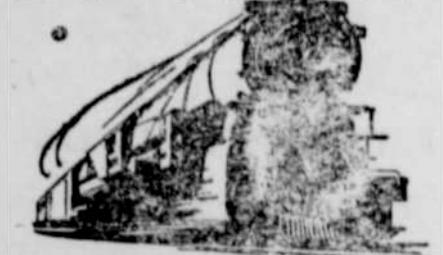

which secured our recognition to "parity" with Great Britain on the seas, but not a single ship has been authorized to give us actual parity. A program, sent to Congress, which would have authorized an aircraft carrier, 3 submarines and two 10,000 ton cruisers, made no progress whatever.

The other nations have not been idle, however. In the 1922-30 period Great Britain has laid down 22 modern destroyers, France 48, Italy 37, and Japan 47. In submarines, during these eight years, France laid down 67, Italy 32, Japan 35, Great Britain 19 and the United States 2.
