LOOKING AT WASHINGTON

(Continued from Page One)

In a presidential year the lot of a chief executive who is forced to face such a dilemma is not a fortunate one and it will require political courage of the highest order for the President to force the issue with Congress.

One of the results of the seven-power conference in London is the apparent isolation of France, bucking the United States, Great Britain and Germany. The French used every weapon that they had, including a raid on British gold reserves, but they attended the parley, even if they gave only limited cooperation.

So deep-seated is the French aversion to what took place that some observers see a heavy blow to the international line-up France fancies she was up against an Anglo-American bloc and that the end of the road of mutual cooperation has come for her and her former allies. Facing two alternatives, capitulation or the formation of a new foreign policy, the French are expected to attempt new friendships, possibly Germany, Italy or Russia.

Of these, strange as it may seem, the Germans loom as the most likely. The recent conversations in Paris between Laval and Bruening were extremely moving and promising as far as words go. It is not the first move towards rapprochement between the two hereditary foes, and more may come of it than from the conversations of the late Dr. Stresemann and Briand if France and Germany get together the fanciful United States of Europe takes form, and Great Britain will be isolated, except from her colonies and to a degree, the United States.
