## EXAMINATION DATE SET FOR BEAVERTON RURAL CARRIER

The United States Civil Service commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural mail carrier at Beaverton, Oregon. The examination will be held at Portland, Oregon, and receipt of applications will close on August 28, 1931.

The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about 15 days after that date. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard route of 24 miles served daily except Sunday is \$1,800 per annum, with an additional \$30 per mile per annum for each mile or fraction thereof in excess of 24 miles. Certain allowances are also made for the maintenance of equipment. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of the postoffice where the vacancy exists who have been actually domiciled there for six months preceding the closing date for receipt of applications, and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Form 1977 and application blanks can be obtained from the vacancy office mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications must be on file with the Commission at Washington, D. C., prior to the close of business on the date specified above. At the examination, applicants must furnish unmounted photographs of themselves taken within two years.

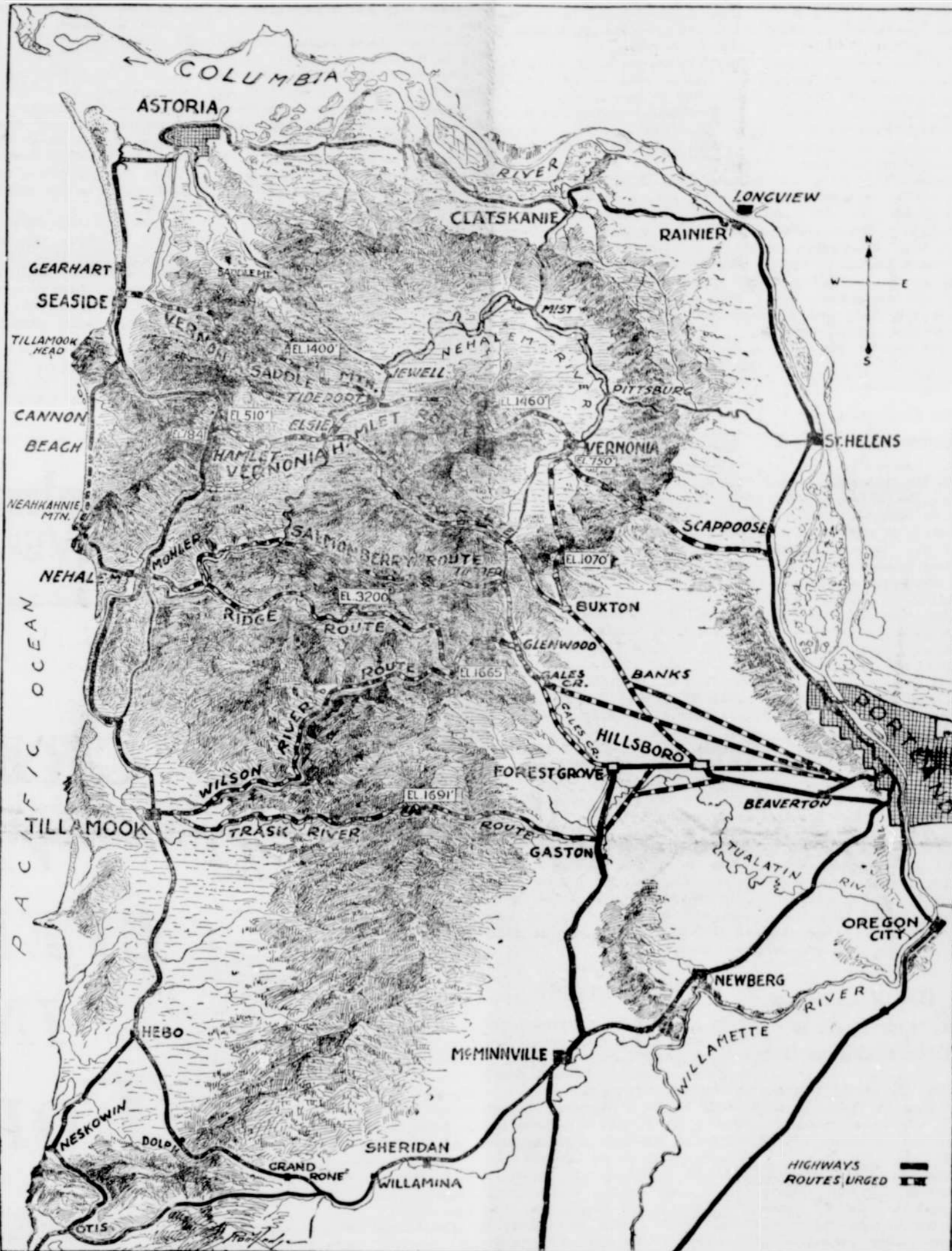

## STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION STUDYING SEVEN PROPOSED ROUTES TO THE SEA

Briefly the course followed by the several proposed "short cut" highways are described as follows:

**Trask River route**—From Portland following the Tualatin Valley highway via Hillsboro and Forest Grove to a point approximately 15 miles north of Gaston, near Patton, with a possible alternative from Hillsboro to Patton along the foothills south of the Tualatin river; from Patton up the Tualatin river via Cherry Grove to the summit between the Tualatin and Trask rivers; thence down the Trask river to Tillamook.

**Wilson River route**—From Portland following the Tualatin Valley highway via Hillsboro and Forest Grove and thence up Gales creek to Glenwood, with a possible alternate route between the Multnomah county line near Portland via Gresco and the Teacher Lake district to Gales creek and Glenwood; thence continuing up Gales creek to the sum-

mit between Gales creek and Devils Lake fork of the Wilson river, down Devils Lake fork and Wilson river to Tillamook.

**Ridge route**—This route is coincident with the Wilson River route as far as the Gales Creek-Devils Lake Fork summit, from which point it follows the divide between the Wilson river drainage on the south and the Nehalem drainage on the north to the head of Cook creek, down Cook creek to the Nehalem and Batterson and down the Nehalem to a junction with the Roosevelt highway at or near Mohler.

**Salmonberry route**—This route would be coincident with the Wilson River route as far as Glenwood, where it would diverge to the north via Timber and Cochran; thence down the Salmonberry and Nehalem rivers to Batterson and coincident with the Ridge route from Batterson to Mohler.

**Vernonia-Hamlet route**—From Portland following the Tualatin Valley highway to Hillsboro and thence to Banks, with a possible alternate route from the Multnomah county line near Portland through the vicinity of North Plains to Banks;

thence to Buxton and Vernonia and via Rock creek and Buster creek to Tideport on the Nehalem river; down the Nehalem to Elsie and across the divide between the Nehalem and Necanicum rivers via Hamlet to a junction with the Roosevelt highway at or near Hamlet junction.

**Vernonia-Saddle Mountain route**—This route would be coincident with the Vernonia-Hamlet route as far as Tideport, where it would diverge toward the north, passing north of Humbug mountain, down the Lewis and Clark river to a point on the Melville-Wahanna county road approximately 2½ miles east of Seaside; thence to Seaside.

Proponents of the Vernonia-Hamlet and Vernonia-Saddle Mountain routes urge construction of a road from Vernonia to a point on the Lower Columbia River highway two miles south of Scappoose.

**Wolf Creek-Hamlet route**—This route would be coincident with the Vernonia-Hamlet route as far as Buxton, when it would diverge in a northwesterly direction cutting into the Vernonia-Hamlet highway again at Elsie, following the route of that highway thence to Hamlet, from which point one fork would continue along the route of the Vernonia-Hamlet route to a junction with the Roosevelt highway at or near Hamlet junction, while a southern fork would follow the north fork of the Nehalem river to a junction with the Roosevelt highway near the town of Nehalem, a distance of approximately 76 miles from Portland.
