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Opposes Sales Tax

It is not surprising to see that the American Federation of Labor vigorously opposes the passage of any sales tax by Congress. This organization of working men favors increasing the income tax and imposing a gift tax as a better way of raising the money necessary to make the budget of the government balance. Their opposition to the sales tax is that in its final phases it will be paid by laborers and farmers although their opposition is based entirely upon the interest of the former rather than of the latter.

The executive committee of the Federation in opposing the sales tax said that the only persons to be benefited by a sales tax "are the 2 per cent of the population who pay an income tax. The burden of the taxation would fall upon the 98 per cent who do not pay an income tax. They now pay an indirect tax on everything they buy. The sales tax will increase that tax load."

Need Men Like This

The British are in the midst of a very exciting and tense political campaign. J. Ramsay MacDonald has been Prime Minister three times but in the recent economic crisis which confronted his country he followed a course which caused his party to reject him. The Labor Party has an opposing candidate and press dispatches tell of MacDonald's campaign in his constituency to be re-elected a member of the House of Commons.

Men like MacDonald are badly needed. Labor would not be performing a service to Britain in defeating for the Commons a statesman who has had the experience that MacDonald has, regardless of temporary differences over present issues. Yet, under present political methods in every country, such leaders are very often rejected by voters in their particular district and the nation as a whole loses the benefits of all training and skill acquired in statesmanship through years of active participation.

MacDonald would be valuable to Great Britain because of his past contact with leaders of foreign governments, if for nothing else. The same is true of other prominent statesmen, now out of office, whose positions in the past have drawn them in contact with the leading spirits of other countries. Yet, party politics and individual political issues very often cause a nation to lose the services of some of its best citizens.

IN OREGON HOMES

GRANTS PASS—Taking the lead in Hoover's unemployment relief program are the two extension agents in Josephine county. Thousands of pounds of fruit and vegetables have been distributed already this fall through Josephine county food conservation organization headed by Sara Wertz, home demonstration agent, and Herbert Howell, agricultural agent. In August alone their organization distributed to needy families 1300 pounds of beans, 200 pounds of beets, six crates of strawberries, four sacks of corn, 30 gallons of blackberries, 500 winter cabbages, 1000 pounds of tomatoes and 1100 boxes of pears. A system of exchanges was worked out by these extension economists through, which for instance one family exchanges potatoes with another family, who has a surplus of peaches. The extension service office serves as a clearing house.

REDMOND—The Northwest Redmond's Women's club is one of several groups holding discussion meet-

ings on "The Progressive Home," study course, based on a series of six programs prepared by Claribel Nye, state leader of home economics, Corvallis. These cover such topics as the successes of the present day family, changes in family relationships, some facts on marriage in the United States, education and the family, management and the family and the family and its leisure. Two cut-of-state study clubs for this course are in Hot Springs National Park, Ark., and Chehalis, Wash.

MOLALLA—Twenty women representing eight different communities met in Sandy recently at the last of the series of home economics extension rallies scheduled in Clackamas county. These fall meetings were held to plan programs. Altogether more than 150 key women participated in the seven meetings which were held in Maple Lane Rock Creek, Barlow, Wilsonville, Oak Grove, Molalla, and Sandy. Thelma Gaylord is home demonstration agent for this county and supervises the county extension program in home economics.

Sarah Anne's Cooking Class

Cakes, not accompanied by any dainty dessert, are sufficient for a whole course. The most important part is the rich fillings and elaborate icings. Colored whipped cream and custard combined with nuts, candied fruits, jams, and jellies make up the best part of the cake. There are many uncooked frostings that are delicious. Try a one-piece dessert next time you see what an attractive cake you can make it.

Graham Cracker Cake

1-2 cup butter,
1-2 cup sugar,
3 eggs,
2-3 cup milk,
2 doz Graham crackers,
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon baking powder
1-2 cup finely chopped nut meats.
Cream butter and sugar until light add beaten egg yolks, then the milk, vanilla and the crackers crushed very fine and blended with the baking powder and nut meats. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites and bake in two layers in greased pans in an oven 375 degrees for twenty-five minutes. Put together with whipped cream and chopped dates.

Angel Food Cake

1 cup egg whites
3-4 teaspoon cream of tartar,
1 1-1 teaspoon almond extract,
1 cup cake flour sifted once, measured and sifted 4 times.
1-4 teaspoon salt,
3-4 teaspoons vanilla extract.

Pour egg whites into a large bowl, add salt and beat with egg beater until foamy. Add cream of tartar and continue beating until eggs are stiff enough to hold up in peaks. Fold in sugar, one tablespoon at a time. Add flavoring. Fold in the flour in the same manner as the sugar. Pour into ungreased angel cake pan and bake in slow oven 275 degrees fifty to sixty minutes. Increasing heat slightly when cake is nearly done.

Enlarge the opening in the center of the Angel cake. Ice the cake. Just before serving put the cake in a silver tray or any pretty china cake plate. Garnish with strawberry preserves. Fill the center with pink whipped cream to which has been added 1 cup of chopped almonds.

Martha Washington Pie

1-3 cup butter,
1 cup sugar,
2 eggs,
1-2 teaspoon vanilla,
1-2 cup milk,
1 1-2 cups flour,
3 teaspoons baking powder.
Cream butter and sugar, add eggs, milk and flour, baking powder, salt, vanilla. Bake in two layers, fifteen minutes, oven 375 degrees. Serve with cream filling.

Cream Filling

1 cup milk,
1-3 cup flour,
1-3 cup milk,
1 egg,
1-3 cup sugar, vanilla,
1-4 teaspoon salt.
Scald cup of milk, make a paste of the flour (with a little water) add to scalded milk. Let cook in double boiler about twenty minutes. Beat the egg, add sugar and salt. Pour into milk and cook until thick. When cold add vanilla. Put between the layers of cake. Dust top layer with confectioners sugar. Serve cut as pie.

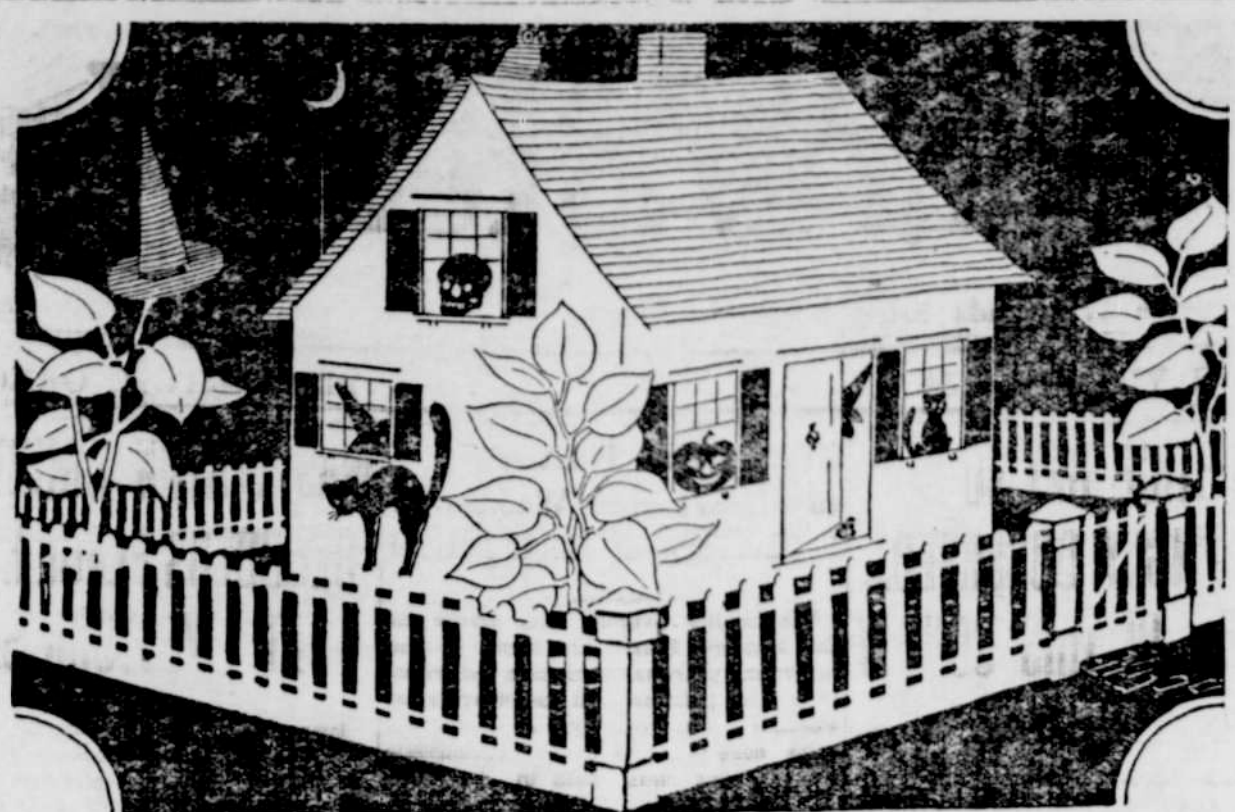
ON OREGON FARMS

HILLSBORO—Several Washington county orchardists are spreading clover straw in the rows between trees this fall, says W. F. Cyrus, county agent. This material has considerable fertilizer value and also supplies a large amount of organic material. Alfalfa hay that was spoiled for feeding during the rainy weather last June is also good fertilizer for the orchard or field, Cyrus says.

McMinnville—More than 40 farmers of Yamhill county harvested either Ohio hardy or Tennessee anthracnose red clover this fall, according to S. T. White county agent. These two varieties are rapidly replacing the common red clover formerly grown in western Oregon, and which is in disfavor in eastern markets.

PENDLETON—Using poison bait, obtained through the county agent's office, orchardists near Freewater have practically cleaned out their orchards. An inspection of the N. W. Mumford orchard for instance, done by mice last year, showed a complete absence of the usual gnawing of fruit boxes in the field and practically no runways on the ground. Orchardists of the county used 194 pounds of rolled out bait this year, says County Agent W. A. Hoyt.

CORVALLIS—Of the total of 7352 cows on test in herd improvement association in Oregon during the past month, 1042 produced more than 40 pounds of butter-fat each, according to the official report of R. W. Morse, dairy specialist of the Oregon State college extension service. The Hood River-Wasco group topped the list of associations this month with an average of 27.5 pounds of butterfat for the 363 cows enrolled. The Pine-Eagle association of Baker county was second and the Central Oregon group third.



HALLOWE'EN HAUNTS

THE table for a Halloween Party may be most attractive as well as very spooky if the hostess selects for her color scheme ghostly white and mysterious black—also the giver of the party may have the satisfaction of knowing that she is doing the very smartest thing, for black and white in decoration of all kinds is the mode of the moment.

The table may be spread with a covering of black oilcloth along the edges of which have been pasted pure white shelf paper in a very open lacey pattern to form a decorative scallop. For the centerpiece a "haunted house" may be selected. It is possible to buy little white pasteboard houses in the toy departments of some shops, but if the only little house which you can find is colored, paint it white with perhaps black shutters.

Black and White Throughout

A low electric light must be set inside the house and ghostly cut-outs of black paper, such as a vague mysterious human figure, a black cat, a witch, or a skull, arranged so as to appear inside the windows. Outside upon the glittering black oilcloth may be painted a little brick walk, the bricks outlined in white, leading to a gate in the white wooden

fence which surrounds an imaginary garden. The fence may be bought at the ten-cent store as a part of a Noah's Ark equipment. Tiny crystal trees, procurable from the same shop, may be placed here and there in the garden. A witch's hat of black paper may hang on one of them, a toad may crouch under another, and upon the white fence may perch a black cat with gleaming green eyes.

If the table is a long one, white candles in white glass or silver candlesticks may be used for illumination, and white or silver bowls containing white flowers may be placed near each end. White paper-lace doilies, if used to indicate each guest's place, will be very smart and effective on the black oilcloth, and the service should be of white china or glass if possible, if not, a white paper

service costs very little. The women guests should be asked to come in white, and the men in black or white.

As much of the food as possible for such a party should be white—white ices, cakes with white icings, etc.

Caviar Stuffed Celery Hearts: Choose small tender hearts of celery and have them crisp and very cold. Keep a can of caviar on ice for at least three hours before using. Then season it with lemon juice and cayenne and stuff celery with it. May serve on white paper doilies on black plates or black paper doilies on white plates.

Chicken, Sweetbread and Pineapple Salad: Dice one 12-ounce can of chicken and add one cup cold diced sweetbreads, one-half cup halved and seeded white grapes and one 1-ounce can of pineapple tidbits. Season to taste with salt and white pepper and moisten with cream mayonnaise. Serve very cold in lettuce cups. Serves eight.

Lemon Milk Sherbet: Scald together one 1-pound can evaporated milk, one and one-fourth cups water, one cup cream and two cups sugar. Then chill thoroughly. Beat one egg well, add three-fourths cup lemon juice and add slowly to the milk. Freeze immediately. Serves eight.

ORANGEMEN WILL MEET COUGARS AT PORTLAND SATURDAY, OCTOBER 31

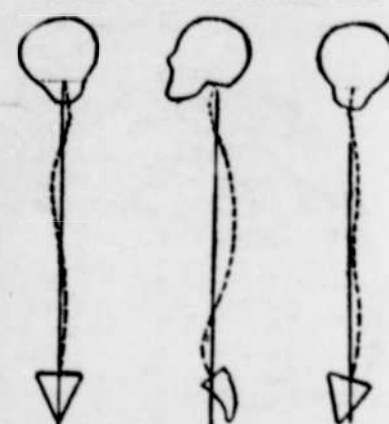
